March

36

March; 10th Temperature; -38 rising to -26 . Very fine day bright sun no wind.

Usual chores in morning, J.J.Wood doing odd jobs in the house, Sidgwick cleaning out stove and warehouse, then went out hunting no luck so had to have eggs for supper. William Kuptanna was down in morning to find out how his account stood for he wishes to settle up if he can on the next trip to his trap line.

Arrivals Peenik came in from his trap line this evening.

March; 11th Temperature; -38 rising to -24 Fine clear cold day, with slight East wind.

About noon Avranna and Peter arrived trade d and pulled out again. Peenik also pulled out for Avranna's. William Kuptanna left this morning for trap line, Hawgok pulled in late last night. Traded on and off all day. Lena Kuptanna and children were down to listen to Coppermine broadcast. Mr Chitt was down for supper.

March 12 th. Temperature; -20. rising to -13 $\frac{1}{2}$ below. Stormy all day with ground drift.

Sidgwick washing clothes and making out District Office Account Current. Woods doing chores and cooking set bread.
No arrivals or departures today.

March 13th . Temperature;-14. rising to -10 with strong N.East wind ground drift.

Sidgwick baking bread , William Kuptanna arrived back late last night brought in some fur. Koochuk arrived from seal camp, reported lots of seals so the people will have lots of feed for themselves and the dogs.

March 14th. Temperature; -16rising to -10 Clear day wind east calming, Mr Chitt was down in afternoon to get ear phones for his short wave sending set he is in touch with Coppermine ever day.

Working at odd jobs and trading a little.

March 15 th . Temperature;-28 rising to minus 20. practically calm all day Went out hunting in morning. William and Lena were down for supper.

March 16 th ; Temperature; - 26 rising to -6. East wind from east. slight drift.

All the locals who were out at seal camp pulled in this morning, overcast for their trap lines. Koochuk and William Kuptanna left this morning. Mr Chitty paid a visit to get our head phones, CLEANED STOVE PIPES TODAY NEEDED IT BADLY.

March 17th; Temperature; - 16 rising to -8. Strong easterly wind, ground drift.

None of the natives except Howgak left for their trap lines. Wood doing his washing, Sidgwick rebuilding snow perch,

March 18th; Temperature; -12 rising to -6. Easterly wind slight snow fall. Clearing up towards evening. Working in store .

No departures as weather still pretty foul for travelling.

March 19th; Temperature; -12 rising to -6 . Fine calm day . All the locals left today except Howgak who is going down to Coppermine with the mail at the end of this week. Working at odd jobs in store and warehouse. Wood mending a rifle for Howgak. Lena Kuptanna paid a visit.

March 20th; Temperature; -22 rising to -14 Fine clear day ver little wind. Worked in store in morning. J. J. Wood getting every thing ready for his trip to Coppermine. While talking to Mr Chitty in the afternoon we saw a raven the first one to be seen this spring. Bayako arrived from seal camp William Kuptanna arrived in evening from trap line.

March 21st; Temperature; -28 rising to -12. Overcast but cleared up before noon cold, with slight Easterly breeze. Wood and Sidgwick worked in store arranging merchandise for spring trade.

In evening Kopek arrived at C.I.C. Post.

March 22nd; Temperature; -14 rising to -10 Overcast in A.M clearing up at noon.

J. Wood and Howgak left for Coppermine at 8.00 A.M.

William Kuptanna pulled out in afternoon for trap line.

March

March, 23rd Temperature; -34 rising to -29. Cold raw day slight Easterly wind
borrowed Mr Chitty's heater and dried out cupboard also cut off
an inch at the back of some of the drawers so they went freeze to the
wall. Peenik arrived late in the evening followed by Johnny one arm.

March; 24th; Temperature. -22 rising to -12. Fine clear day, slight Easterly breeze
Worked at chores all morning, getting in coal into snow porch,
filling gasoline container, etc. Saw a flock of ptarmigan so
went after them they were to wild and are the first big flock to
arrive at Read for some time.
Peenik left for his trap line early this morning.

March; 25th. Temperature; -20 rising to -6. Fine clear day with easterly wind.
Worked all day at odd jobs round the house and in the store.
Heard over broadcast that J. Weed and native Hewgak arrived at
Fort Mearns yesterday at 3.0'clock in the afternoon a quick trip.
B. Klengenberg and William Kuptanna pulled in this evening about
8.30 Bobb^r stayed here the night and brought in a pike of fur
towards his account. Bobb^r reported that Avakenna had shot 3 caribes
-u inland from No man point so they may be coming arround and we
shall be able to get meat.

March; 26th. Temperature. - 16 rising to -6. Strong Easterly wind ground drift overcast.
Glass ver^r high the highest I have seen it yet reading 30.73.
Traded with Bobb^r Klengenberg and he settled his account.
Mr Chitty paid a visit so did William Kuptanna.
Mavake and Peenik arrived back from trap line the foxes seem to be
comming back for Mavake got 8 and reported many tracks. both men
were slightly snow blind. B Klengenberg pulled out at 4.0 o'clock.

March; 27th. Temperature. -8 rising to -5. Strong North Easterly wind ground drift.
Worked at odd jobs and did some trading. Mr Chitty came down at
5.0'clock to get the fur press as he had received word that the
plane was coming to get his fur so we can expect it some time
next week. William Kuptanna paid a visit.

24

March 28th; Temperature; -18 rising to -6. Very lovely day bright sun all day.

Avalone pulled in about noon and traded and left fur on his account. Worked at odd jobs the rest of the day. Mr Chitty hard at it baling his fur. Leon Kuptanna and children were down for supper.

March 29th; Temperature. -30 rising to -10. Fine clear day Easterly breeze with wind switching to the south east. Heard over V.H.F. that no planes had left the south for the North due to bad weather.

Baked bread and did odd jobs all day. Worked in the office in the evening.

March 30th; Temperature; -20 rising to zero. Fine clear day Slight snow fall during the night. Poo'tuk pulled in this morning and stayed the night. Worked in the office all day on returns to go out on the plane that is due here tomorrow or the next day We heard that it had reached Camaren bay this evening.

March 31st; Temperature; -30 rising to -12 .Fine and clear in morning South West wind, but by noon the wind changed to West n' west and was strong with slight ground drift. The mail reached Coppermine at 1'o'clock and is coming over for the C.T.C. Fur tomorrow.

Finished the March returns to go out. Poenik and Mayako pulled out for trap lines so did Poo'tuk. Oudlitan arrived in afternoon.

April

April 1st; Temperature; -12 rising to -8 Very bad day no planes . Strong North wind with heavy ground drift. Visibility 50 feet clearing up towards evening. Mowgak and J.J. Wood arrived late last night after a two day trip from Coppermine. They were followed by Koochuk and William Neptune also Taptoon and Bayaks, from their trap lines. The locals had a very poor hunt only 5 or 6 foxes between the 1st . Hope it picks up before they pick up their traps.

April 2nd; Temperature; -25 rising to zero. Fine clear day after the storm of yesterday All the natives are waiting for the plane and so far we have no idea when it will pull in for today we had no communication with Coppermine . But are expecting it tomorrow as the weather looks settled.

April 3rd ;Temperature; -31 rising to -27. Calm clear fine day Slight northwesterly breeze All anxiously waiting for plane which failed to arrive due to bad weather to the south. No arrivals. William and Koochuk left for Rymer Point. Local natives wandering in and out.

April 4th; Temperature; -30 rising to -20 Strong North wind ground drift. Clear over head No movement of plane from Coppermine.
Doing odd jobs and waiting for the Sound natives.

April 5th; Temperature; -22 rising to -4 Strong N.E/West wind ground drift. sunny with poor visibility . Wood baking bread and washing floors.
Amakak and wife and child arrived at 5.15 p.m from the Sound

April 6th; Temperature; -22 rising to -2. Fine clear day no wind . Fog in morning. Hauled ice in forenoon. Went hunting in afternoon. Heard from Amakak that the Sound men were catching no fur in fact they have done so badly since June that they are not coming down for a while This is very bad news as we were looking forward to a big hunt as all these men have debt which looks as if it will not be paid this spring. William Neptune arrived from Rymer point this afternoon The plane is staying the night at Cambridge Bay

April

36

April 7th Temperature; -30 rising to -8. Fine day but foggy so the plane did not come over. Avryanna and wife and children Peoytuk and Alagumiaq arrived for a visit. Hwangok Peemik and Nayake also arrived. Nayake had one of his bad attacks and very nearly died we carried him up to the house and doctorred him up a very close thing for the man. Avryanna reported that he had caught two Silver Foxes one had been eaten but he will show me the other tomorrow, very unusual on Victoria land.

Nearly all the locals have their traps pulled and the rest will have them up in a day or two. so ends another season.

Wood saw a couple of crews today.

April 8th Temperature; -26 rising to -10. Clear over-head with East wind 5 m.p.h slight mist on the horizon. The plane arrived for the C.T.C. fur at 12.30, C.P.A.M.Z. with Mat Berry and Rex Hartlyin charge. The fur 9 bales were loaded and the outgoing mail then the plane stalled till 1.45 after they had received a weather report from Coppermine. Left before two o'clock and were back at Coppermine soon after 3'oclock and on their way out. A great many of the natives at Read had never seen a plane so were all het up. Traded with Avryanna and Alagumiaq the latter paid his debt. After supper three three teams arrived from the North sound Honeyuk, Anowmuk and Jacob, the latter brought down the Walker Bay mail which missed the plane by a few hours. Received a letter from I. Holt who seems to be doing well, also a letter from Mr Rowan who complains that he is short of merchandise for the spring trade like a lot of other posts.

April 9th Temperature; -26 rising to -17 Fine day strong North west wind, slight ground drift. Traded off and on all day the men that are in are coming through with their debts nicely. Mr Chitty paid a visit in morning. Weekiak arrived in afternoon and paid a visit in evening. Tuptooma went off this morning to get seals from his cache returned in the evening.

April

April 10th Temperature; -28 rising to -16 Cold West Wind slight ground drift.

Still the people keep arriving today Avakenna Bobby Klengenberg and families arrived followed by Kulugok Keeletanna and in the afternoon J. Norberg and wife. the only one from the east not in yet is Okituk. No trading today due to it being Good Friday.

April 11th; Temperature; -30 rising to -16 Cold West wind Okituk arrived and paid all his debt which is more than some are doing. Avakenna also squared up. Worked in store and in house writting letters to go to Coppermine and Kugaryuk with Johnny Norberg.

April 12 th Temperature; -22 rising to - 10 Very fine day bright sun no wind.

The first dog race to be held at Raad was run to day from the Post to Seven mile point and back. 16 teams started and the first man home was back in one hour and thirty minutes the order of finishing was as follows;

1. Kuleeguk, 30 feet ahead of William Anowmuk, 3 David Keeletanna
 4. Avakenna, 5 Kostchuk, 6 Avramna, 7 Bobby Klengenberg, 8 Peeyutuk
 - 9 William Oudlilik, 10 Newgek 11 John Norberg the following also ran Anowmuk, Johnyone arm, Taptoona Jacob and Peonik.
- This race caused great excitement and sure filled in the day. In the evening the men had running races.

Mucky mink pulled in at supper time with a load of Caribou meat which I bought also has some fur which I hope to get.

Some of the men are pulling out tomorrow and the rest on Tuesday.

April 13th; Temperature; -30 rising to - 16 Clear cold day North East wind, bright sun

Anekuk Manyeuk Anowmuk Taptoon and Oudlilik pulled out for the sound this morning. Will be back at the end of the month.

All the rest are pulling out tomorrow. Traded on and off all day Asked William for some more fur to settle his account and he got mad and is disphensed with the Company now but I guess he will come round again, I had a feeling that since Mr Chitty let him live in Grahame's old house we should lease him for he was to close to the opposition to trade with the ~~Company~~.

April 14th Temperature; -28 rising to -12 Clear fine day hot in the sun. A general exodus today the following left Kuleguk Koosuk Maletnaa Avramna Robby Mengenberg Boekieuk Chaituk Alagumiaq Poo'tuk for Walker Bay, Johnny Norberg and William Knutson with J. J. Wood for Kugaryuk. Wood had the chance to go with a very little expense attached so as H. J. Gill wanted him I sent him down. I know it is a little early but if he left later it would mean hiring adis- team; The only natives left are Avramna, Newgak and Mankymiaq who will be away in the morning to their various destinations. Nels Invatson arrived after supper.

April 15th. Temperature; -28 rising to -8. All the rest of the natives pulled out today Avramna and Peenik to the West Howgak to Kugaryuk Muyako to the Oknilik Islands. Nels paid a visit and stayed till after the Coppermine broadcast. Heard that Conet Chartrand had left for Read Island via Bernard Harbour, also The Roman Catholic Father with A. L'Heureux as guide can't make out why they are coming now for there are no natives at Read and we are not expecting any till May. Washed floors and cleaned up the house it sure needed it after the gang that has been in.

Weather today extremely fine hot sun light East breeze.

April 16th; Temperature; -22 rising to -10 Strong East wind ground drift. Baked bread and cleaned house. Jacob pulled in from River point said that all the gang there had gone off to Kugaryuk. Had the ladies up this evening cleaning fences. Nels came to supper and stayed to 1 o'clock.

April 17th; Temperature; 8 above rising to 10 above Strong East wind ground drift.

In evening the Father A. L'Heureux and native arrived followed by Conet; Chartrand and Tommy Goss. Paid a visit to The C. T. C. in evening and stayed till midnight.

April 18th; Temperature; -10 rising to more. Strong East wind ground drift clear over-head. Visited all the day a little trading and lots of cooking. All the visitors ready to pull out tomorrow.

April 19th; Temperature; -14 rising to 2 above, fine bright day slight East wind.

All our visitors were away today The Father and L'Houroux pulled out at 11.45 a.m. followed by the Police, and Tapteena who is on his way to get meat from Eungaryuk.

April 20th; Temperature; -14 rising to 6 above. Fine sunny day slight east breeze.

Worked at odd jobs in house and outside. Nels paid a visit in evening.

April 21st Temperature; Zero rising to plus 11 Fine calm sunny day Very hot in the sun real spring weather. Worked at odd jobs outside all day.

hauled ice by hand sled. Alagumiak and wife arrived in afternoon Avramna must have gone over to see Lucy at Watsons and this man did not like staying alone so came to Read for a visit.

April 22nd; Temperature; -16 rising to plus 14 Fine day slightly overcast.

The Sound men arrived in the afternoon the following men and wives arrived; Muzzooma, Kjalmak, Kyrek, Melvrauna, Pamiadlik, Kneutuk, Heelak, Kaptuna Frank, Amekok. The rest should be along soon. They all seem to have fur but not as much as we hoped.

April 23rd; Temperature; Plus 8 rising to plus 26. Dull day in afternoon it snowed then blew hard all the rest of the day.

Started trading at 9:00 o'clock and was hard at it on and off all day Most the our men paid their debts a few were shy though.

The sound men have sure had a poor hunt since Xmas, and Mr Chitty says it is the worst spring trade for years. There are still a few to trade so things may pick up also a few have still to arrive.

April 24th; Temperature; Plus 6 rising to plus 20. Fine very warm all day clouded over in the evening. Traded on and off all day This evening five more arrived Palvik, Tadlidliak, Neogaluk, Ohkima and Ootcoowayuk.

April 25th Temperature; Plus 11 rising to plus 26. Very stormy day strong N.West wind about 50 m.p.h. with heavy surface drift. Traded in morning then worked in office. The people were in and out but I only saw the gang that is down our end the rest stayed down at Mr Chitty's. I wish they would pull out soon as they are now on the bum having done all their trading.

April 26th Temperature; -4 rising to plus 2 Still stormy but the wind dropped by evening and it turned colder. This storm has been one of the ~~rainiest~~ ^{rainiest} this outfit and has piled up the snow into huge drifts. Had a moment today free from Huskies as they had Church twice so managed to get a few odd jobs done. Traded for two hours in afternoon with some of the C.T.C. men they sure brought down a bunch of pink fur some I bought at \$1.00 each.

April 27th. Temperature; -8 rising to plus 12. Fine day in the morning clouded up in the afternoon with slight snow. Worked in Office all day. None of the natives are ready to pull out yet they seem to be waiting for the gang to return from Kugaryuk so as to be able to get deerskins.

April 28th. Temperature; Plus 5 rising to plus 6 falling towards night to below zero. Blowing hard again from North West heavy ground drift visibility 20 to 50 feet. The weather for the past week has been some of the worst experienced this winter as regards blows. Some odd thing today the natives hanging around, one can hardly dare go to the store or a bunch of them will be in on the bum. Checked the fur taken in the last few days, five pelts are real blue backs the rest are pretty good, not as good fur as the local natives have been turning in. No sign of the men returning from their trip to Kugaryuk.

April 29th Temperature; -8 rising to -2 Still blowing from North West ground drift. Numerous fixed the snow perch in A.M. Kuptana Joe pulled out for Kugaryuk this morning to get deerskins.

April - May

36

April 30th; Temperature: -12 rising to plus 2 Another stormy day still blowing and drifting from the North West. Worked in store during the a.m checking the fur fand quite a few have to be cleaned to take out the smoke from the Radiator. Baked a batch of bread and managed to get a few minutes peace during the evening.

I. Balt and wife and man arrived about 5.30 from the North side of the sound, he was looking very well but stopped down at Chitty's so as to be near Leana Ruptanna.

May 1936

May 1st; Temperature: -3 rising to plus 2 Same kind of day as the last few blowing and drifting from the North West cleared up towards night, and looks as if it will be fine tomorrow As far as I can find out the people are just waiting for the wind to drop before pulling out. Worked in office all day closing off the April books can not finish until the people leave for one never knows what they will change at the last minute of the goods they have bought.

May 2nd; Temperature: -8 rising to plus 12 Fine clear day today the first one for about ten days Soon after 11 o'clock this morning we saw 4 teams arriving from the East the were the lads from Kugaryuk William Ruptanna, Avakkena Bobby Klingenberg, and Kooteahuk. They were very welcome as the Sound men were waiting to get deerkins from them. The trade picked up a bit today and I did good business. At 8.30 this evening the following pulled out for Rymer Point; Avakkena, Bobby Klingenberg, I. Balt and wife, Anakuk and Jacob, the last two will be back tomorrow to see The Rev J. H. Webster. Last night the following men arrived after I had written up the day's events; Momeuk and Jacob. I now have for the Company over 1000 white fawns and am expecting a few more before the end of May.

Sunday 3rd Temperature; -10 plus 26 warmest day yet slightly overcast snow getting soft. This morning all the natives were collecting up their boxes and will be pulling out as soon as they have seen Rev Webster who is expected any time now. This afternoon Avranna and wife and kids arrived, they had just got back from paying the Watsons a visit. He brought in the last of his fur which makes his catch 102 foxes this season ,our high man.

Soon after 9 o'clock Ifelt and his gang from Rymer Point arrived followed by Jacob Friday and the Rev; J.H.Webster.

Monday 4th. Temperature; -10 rising to plus 8. Fine cold North breeze. Church is the order of the day to day three or four services held. Rev J.H.Webster had tea with me this afternoon. Ames Anderson and a lad from inland arrived this A.M.

Tuesday 5th. Temperature; -6 rising to plus 30 Overcast warm slight east breeze.

Church the order of the day again three services for the natives and one in the Company House for the Whites . I had to get Rev J.H.Webster to lance Avranna's right hand due to him getting a bad case of blood poisoning in it he fixed it up and I will dress it for the next few days. I saw the first birds today.

Soon after midnight the Rymer Point gang pulled out followed by Rev J.H.Webster and Friday. Soon after the had left Kuptana and Tadlidiaq pulled in from Kugaryuk.

Wednesday 6 th ;Temperature; -2 rising to plus 20 Blowing hard from the East with heavy ground drift. Only 5 teams pulled out today Jacob, Anewmuk, Puniadluk, Kyreck, and Ochima. The rest we hope will pull out as soon as the wind drops. Worked at odd jobs all day baked bread, put new pane of glass in bedroom window which got broken by a kid with a stone, also mended a primus stove. Dressed Avranna's hand. Mr Chitty came down for supper to get away from the gang.

Thursday 7th; Temperature; plus 12 rising to plus 16. Stormy day blowing from East with

Thursday 7th (Continued) heavy ground drift. We are paying for the fine weather we had about 3 weeks ago. No one left today and are still a curse. Lucy Avranna cleaned foxes for me. Until supper I worked in the Office on April returns.

Friday 8th Temperature; plus 16 rising to plus 28. Calm, overcast slight snow fall in afternoon. All the natives except 6 pulled out today to our joy. Managed to get some work done in store and warehouse. Traded with Avranna in morning. Worked in office in evening.

William Kuptanna brought down the last of his fur and paid his account. he and his family pulled out for Rymer Point in evening, after a six months stay at Road.

Sat; 9th. Temperature; plus 12 rising to plus 18. Very fine day bright sun warm.

At 7 'oclock Metookona and wife arrived and pitched their tent down by the Company House. Worked in Warehouse checking Customers fur. Cleaned foxes and traded with Metookona. In evening Kawgok and family arrived from Kugaryuk after nearly a months visit. E. J. Gall forgot to send Avranna's deerskins as ordered and made John sore especially as I had written Mr Gall and asked him to be sure and send them. About 10.30 p.m. Kahok and Kuptana pulled out also Tadlidiaq and Oodlituk, the only Sound native left is Anasak. Bill Steer arrived from Bernard Harbour about 10 o'clock

Sun. 10th Temperature; - 10 rising to plus 16 Fine sunny day slight North East breeze. Worked in office and at odd jobs all day. Bill Steer pulled out in evening. Avranna also left about 8.30 for his place.

Monday 11th; Temperature; plus 2 rising to plus 28 Fine bright day Warm. Moved ice stage to North side of house also buried all fresh meat and the last of the potatoes in a snow bank. Worked in Office. Some of the natives went off sealing as a few seal have been seen on the ice a month late this year. It sure is a late spring and is still cold at night.

May

36

Tues; 12th Temperature; Plus 2 rising to plus 10 Fine bright day cold wind N.West. Avranna and Betekona left today to bring in the rest of Betekona's stuff he cached on the land. Worked in office all day getting mail ready to go to Coppermine when Rev Webster arrives next week.

Wed; 13th Temperature; -6 rising to plus 9 Snowy Cold day strong Westerly wind ground drift. The natives are starting to drift away and today Hewgok went inland to his trapping camp to collect his junk and to try for some fish with hooks. Nukadluk went back to Bernard Harbour. Betekona and Avranna drifted in some time early today with the rest of Betekona's stuff. In evening William Kuptanna and Koosak blew in from Rymer Point stayed a while then went off again. Worked at odd jobs in A.M. and finished up the book work in the afternoon.

Thur; 14th Temperature; -2 rising to plus 19 Fine sunny day warm towards evening. No arrivals or departures today . Worked at odd jobs all day .

Fri; 15th Temperature; -9 rising to plus 18 Fine sunny day cold wind East. Today Betekona and Bayako pulled out for Coppermine on a visit followed by Avranna who went home. In afternoon a team arrived from Walker Bay and my missing mail from District Office turned up, the corrected Inventory and other mail , it had been sent to W.J with their mail. Cleaned out the store and then cleaned fence.

In evening Artigook and wife pulled in from Bernard Harbour.

Sat; 16th Temperature; -6 rising to plus 9 strong north east wind ground drift cold. Cleaned fence all day . Traded a little today as well. Received wire from District Manager and find the 259 records are over at Bernard Harbour. Must write Inspector Gibeon and find out if I shall go over for them.

Sun; 17th Temperature; -6 rising to plus 19 Strong West wind slight ground drift, clear overhead and bright sun. Atigiuaq pulled out this morning. Baked bread and then walked round the island no sign of any birds the ptarmigan are not here this spring . After supper six teams pulled in from Nymer Point. I. Bolt E. Klengenberg and Malrock who will pull out in a few days for the North. Avakenna and William Lena and kids to wait for Rev Webster also Kulugek who came to settle up I hope. Worked in office entering sales and furs purchased till after 11 o'clock.

Mon; 18th. Temperature; -4 rising to plus 14. Very fine day bright sun no wind. Took top off half the snow porch in a.m. Worked at odd jobs the rest of the day. Khlegek paid up his debt. The rest of the natives are just waiting for the Rev Webster who should be along tomorrow.

Tues; 19th Temperature; plus 7 rising to plus 28 Very warm day cloudy in a.m with slight snow clearing up in afternoon to a very fine day . While trading in the store with I. Bolt I received a message from Mr Chitty to hurry down to see him as he was passing blood I ran down and found him pretty sick as he had had a hematemesis and wanted me to help put him to bed with I Bolts help we managed it , and sent off two teams to find Webster who is on his way and bring him back. After one more bad attack Mr Chitty was easier and rested all evening quietly . I stayed down till 2 o'clock when Nels Havatum arrived. At 3 o'clock Rev Webster had not arrived so went to bed.

Wed; 20th. Temperature; -9 rising to plus 14 Stormy day clear overhead with strong N. East wind 22 miles per hour. Ground drift. No sign of Rev Webster -r today Mr Chitty easier but weak. Nels spent afternoon at my place. in evening traded with I. Bolt and fixed him up for the summer His man may leave tomorrow if fine.

Thur; 21st. Temperature; plus 12 rising to plus 18. Very stormy strong N.East wind ground drift visibility a few feet . Mr Chitty about the same today still has pain in stomach. Amokok and Avakenna arrived back this afternoon from Lady Franklin point where they met Webster's man no sign of the Rev Webster who must be held up by the bad weather at Richardson Island anyway Friday has gone to find him and tell him to hurry . They report the weather very bad to the east worse than it is here. Worked at odd jobs and in the office.

Fri; 22nd. Temperature; plus 14 rising to 22 . Still blowing hard snowing as well to make life more miserable, this is the third day so it may clear. Mr Chitty still very sick and a little weaker I thought as he is still passing bleed. Heard over V.B.K. that the following had arrived at Coppermine; W.Gibson, Bill Stoer, Slim Purcell and J. Norberg. Worked at odd jobs in store and warehouse also baked bread.

Sat; 23rd. Temperature; plus 18 rising to plus 32. Still blowing but not so hard, clearing in the south very warm today snow wet. Early this morning four teams arrived from the Sound I was woken up and had to make tea for five . Traded in forenoon then went down to see Chitty he seems to be a little better today has not passed blood for 12hours but is very weak. We expect Rev Webster in some time today.

Sun; 24th. Temperature; plus 22 rising to 46 above overcast but very warm . Natives held Church service this morning I. Holt was the preacher. Mr Chitty seems to be better today . At five o'clock the Websters arrived and after supper he visited Mr Chitty and had a look at him gave him instructions about his illness. Then held a service.

Mon; 25th Temperature; plus 22 rising to 32. Overcast a little colder. Mr Chitty much better today more like his old self . Church was the order of the day three services. All the natives read to pull out and will leave some time tonight. It was well after midnight before the men pulled out.

Tues; 26th. Temperature; Plus 20 rising to plus 26. Cool East wind overcast.

Very few natives left and all will be away in a few days . The Webeters resting another day before pulling out for Bernard Harbour. Got mail ready to send to Coppermine with them. Heard that the Snowflaker had arrived at Coppermine.

Wed; 27th. Temperature; Plus 20 rising to plus 30. East wind fine. Bayake and Beteckanna arrived in early this morning. The Webeters left for Bernard Harbour at 4.30 this afternoon. After supper worked at odd jobs, filled water barrels with ice, cleaned house and paid a visit to see how Mr Chitty was, he is fine now but still in bed resting.

Thur; 28th. Temperature; plus 8 rising to plus 28 cold dull day strong east wind.

Worked in store and warehouse all day getting things in shape to take Inventory on Monday. Paid a visit to see Chitty in evening. Just before midnight it started to rain and sleet and blow hard a very dirty night.

Fri; 29th; Temperature; plus 28 rising to plus 33. Stormy in morning with sleet and rain, cleared up in afternoon and was fine by evening. The three native families that are left getting ready to pull out and should be away by morning. Cleaned up the rest of the faxes and will check all fur the day after tomorrow.

Sat; 30th; Temperature; plus 18 rising to plus 28 cold dull day . All the natives away except William Daptanna who would have gone long ago but Lena has been pretty sick. Worked all day in the warehouse counting the deer skins and balacing them for the summer, worked in the office after supper.

Sun; 31st. Temperature; plus 18 rising to plus 28. Fine clear day cold east wind just thawing in the sun. Washed clothes and cleaned house. Worked in office. Mr Chitty up for a while today. William Daptanna pulled out today .

June 1st, Temperature; plus 16 rising to plus 44. Very fine day the warmest yet bright sun no wind, thawed quite a bit today. Checked all the fur in warehouse found it agreed with fur book, then started to take Inventory with interruptions I finished the groceries and Hardware. Avramna and Etokoona pulled in in the afternoon to take away a load of Etokoona's junk. Was talking to Avramna who reports three big ice cracks to the west, also he was remarking at the number of ptarmigan that are around now, they are thick on this island at ~~now~~ last very late this year. He says that the seals are only just coming up onto the ice very late like ever thing this year it looks like a late break up. The ice at Coppermine seems to be getting wet but it is also late down there.

Anyway the new Outfit has started off with a glorious day which I hope means a fine year in the Fur Trade.

June 2nd Temperature; plus 15 rising to plus 40. Very fine day warm slight south wind, the snow sure went today and pools of water were amongst the rocks saw the first ducks and geese today. Finished taking Inventory Worked in office after supper, about 10 o'clock Artiguak arrived from the Islands reported seeing numerous geese but very few seals also said there weren't any cracks between here and Bernard Harbour sure is late this year. He traded then pulled out again.

June 3rd Temperature; plus 20 rising to plus 38. dull overcast day looks like rain. Extended Inventory and baked bread. Nels left for Bernard Harbour in evening. Johnny - one arm and I cut ice after supper and filled water barrels. Heard that the Coppermine river had flooded over on Monday. Saw more geese today.

June 4th Temperature; plus 27 rising to plus 40. Fine bright day wind shifting all round the compass ended up in the North West. Finished extending Inventory. After supper paid Chitty a visit he was O.K. Then hauled ice for the house. Worked in Office from 9.30 to 11 o'clock.

June 5th Temperature; Plus 26 rising to plus 40 Cool North West breeze overcast.
Worked in office all day.

June 6th Temperature. plus 24 rising to plus 40 Fine mild day. Received wire from Inspector Gibon answering my questions. Started to dig trenches through the snow drifts round the house some job due to the large amount of snow piled up. Worked in office in evening.

June 7th Temperature;

plus 26 rising to plus 40 dull day with a few scattered rain showers. Quite a fog came up in the evening and it turned over. Finished the trenches and find I still have one more to do to drain round the house. The ice in the inner harbour has almost cracked in several places and pools of water have formed in lots of places. The snow is sinking rapidly and soon the big drifts will be the only snow left.

June 8th. Temperature; - plus 30 rising to plus 44 Fine bright day clouded up after supper and rained quite hard. Finished digging the draining ditch. Baked bread and worked in office till 10.30 p.m.
The inner bay covered with water and patches are showing up on the outer bay ice now, it is just about the same as last year.

June 9th. Temperature; - plus 26 rising to plus 34 The rain of last night turned to snow early this morning and was quite a heavy fall, all day it was cloudy with a strong N. West wind. Worked in office all day.

June 10th. Temperature; - plus 22 rising to plus 36 stormy day snow flurries all day Worked in office and outside. J. One-owl went out after ducks at the west end of the island and found lots of ^{young} snow and elder ducks, also saw geese but was unable to get near to them. V.A.K. came over very well this afternoon.

June

26

June 11th. Temperature; plus 26 rising to plus 42 Dull day warm. Went round the west end of Island after ducks this morning saw lots but were to wild to get close enough for a shot. Bayaks pulled in from sealing in evening. Typed Inventory in evening.

June 12 th Temperature; plus 30 rising to plus 44. Dull overcast day cool S.East wind. Worked at Inventory but had many interruptions for first Nels arrived from Bernard Harbour with letters from Coppermine. After V.B.K. a bunch pulled in from Avrasen's, Metkoona, Avakenna, Newgak, and Pooytuk with wife, they all traded seals and then beat it. Worked late in the office.

June 13th. Temperature; plus 30 rising to plus 40 The sun shone for a few hours today the first time for quite a while then as usual it clouded up and turned cool again. Finished typing Inventory .

June 14th. Temperature; plus 29 rising to plus 34 Cool dull day. Dug out the west side of the store as the snow water was trickling through as the big large drift thawed. In evening paid a visit to the C.T.C.

June 15th Temperature; plus 26 rising to plus 38 Cool Westerly breeze some sun. Cut some more draining ditches in forenoon then helped Nels take engine out of whale boat. Worked in office in evening. Freezing when I went to bed, so far every night it has frozen.

June 16th Temperature; plus 25 rising to plus 44 Very fine day bright hot sun . Made out the Merchandise Book today. Now am being held up with the C.T.C. account not ready yet. Freeze again tonight.

June 17th. Temperature; plus 30 rising to plus 38 . Cool East wind strong at times. Part cloudy rain in evening. Did not feel to good today, cold in stomach or something. Did odd job. Nels and J. Tukluk were out all day setting nets under the seal holes they seem very successful at this time of year . Noticed the first wild flowers out today also.

June 17th.

(Continued) lots of water on the outer harbour ice not drained off yet. Heard over V.B.K. that the ice in the river was on the move.

June 18th. Temperature; plus 38 rising to plus 44. Fine bright day. Did odd jobs such as washing, cleaning out seal house, filling water barrels with snow in a.m. In p.m. went for a walk round the west end of island noticed lots of ducks and several flowers in bloom. Had supper down at the C.T.C. then was taught to make a seal net. Worked in the Office from 9:10-30.

June 19th. Temperature; plus 30 rising to plus 42. Fine warm day. Cool breeze in the evening. Worked at odd jobs round the buildings for it is still to cold and damp to begin painting. Finished off the Office work on hand until I get the C.T.C. account I can't finish off my 266 books. Coppermine was in a hurry so had a short broadcast today.

June 20th. Temperature; plus 32 rising to plus 44. Slight rain early today cleared up and was hot. Nels, Chitty and I pulled up the whale boat ~~completely~~ clear of all ice to turn her over so they can repair the bottom. William Kuptanna and Smokestack paid a visit in afternoon left again about 9:00' clock.

June 21st. Temperature; plus 38 rising to plus 44. Fine but cloudy with slight rain showers. Last night was the first night that it did not freeze. Worked all day making a step out side the front door, finished by supper. Nels also brought back the fur press.

June 22nd. Temperature; plus 33 rising to plus 42. Dull day heavy clouds in the East looked like rain but it held off. Began the painting today did the inside of the W.C. first coat. Worked in Office in evening.

June 23rd. Temperature;

June 23rd. Temperature; plus 32 rising to plus 44. Fine clear day . Painted the house roof and W.C. roof with shinglbeam. In evening Nels and I went hunting. Heard that the Neglik is leaking badly and the G.T.C. fur may go out by plane in the summer. Also heard that the river went out on Monday .

June 24th. Temperature; plus 31 rising to plus 58. The warmest day yet. Fine bright sun all day . Painted the house and gave the W.C. two coats. Nels and Johnny-one-arm were out setting seal nets. V.R.K. told us a plane for Inspector Gibson was expected at the end of this week. Fishing was in full swing at Coppermine while here the ice has hardly cracked yet, still lots of water to drain off .

June 25th Temperature; plus 34 rising to plus 52 Fine clear day clouded up in the evening and turned cool. Finished painting the house and W.C.. Decided not to paint the white on the warehouse as it is in good shape and was done last year but will touch up the trim. After supper helped Nels turn over the whale boat. Mayaks blew in and stayed for a while.

June 26th. Temperature; plus 34 rising to plus 48. Overcast . Painted trim round house and W.C. cleaned up a bit but it is too damp to rake yet. Heard that Ross is bringing back a wife.

June 27th. Temperature; plus 34 rising to plus 50 Very fine day one of the nicest yet. Finished painting the trim and the inside of W.C. After cleaned up round the east end of the house where an igloo had been hauled out onto the ice four loads of meat. Nels and Johnny were out to look at seal nets also were going to try for fish in the cracks.

June 28th. Temperature; plus 38 rising to plus 62 Fine bright day strong south wind.

June

6

June 28th (Continued) painted the shify first coat. Took a walk over the island noticed the first mosquito. Nels had no luck fishing the deepest place they tried sounded 30 fathoms. They had good luck with the seal nets for they got six, three seal in one net.

June 29th. Temperature, plus 35 rising to plus 48. Strong West wind but it died down by evening. Could not finish the outside painting until after supper. Dug out seal pit and put in fresh seal. Also put new glass into East window. Got the fur press and ever thing ready to begin baling fur tomorrow.
A few visitors today Alagumiaq and wife from the west, Avakenna, Koletanna, and Hawgak from the east.

June 30th. Temperature; plus 30 rising to plus 36. Cold dull day with strong West wind. Freez last night then today we had rain, snow and sunshine. Raled fur all day. Nels and J.one-arm went to visit seal nets.

July 1936.

July 1st. Temperature; plus 30 rising to 36. Another cold day. Rained hard in afternoon which turned to snow. Baled fur all day.

July 2nd. Temperature; plus 30 rising to 36. Another cold storm day with rain and snow flurries. strong wind due west. Finished baling the fur have the ends to sew and mark. After supper helped Chitty check his fur the total collection for this year is 1803, foxes, 702 foxes more than what the Company has.

July 3rd. Temperature; plus 25 rising to 40. Cold dull day not quite so windy. Cleared up a little in evening and with a rising glass it may be fine tomorrow. Finishing off the fur bales just have the labels to put on and stretch them now.

July 4th. Temperature; plus 34 rising to 42. Fine day but a cool south wind.

Finished off the fur bales. After supper walked down to the east end of inner harbour to see what the ice was doing I found that the east end had rotted out and was clear for 2 to 3 hundred yards but so far the ice has not cracked as it usually does across so it cant move at all.

July 5th. Temperature; plus 36 rising to plus 40. Fine clear day turned warm toward evening. Finished all the fur bales, marked, weighed, and labeled. Just before supper Nels and Johnny came down for the fur press. Chitty is baling his fur tomorrow. Heard that the plane arrived at Coppermine and left today with Inspector W. Gibson.

July 6th. Temperature; plus 36 rising to 52. Fine day strong East wind.

Did a big washing, all the curtains and cushion covers, sheets etc. After supper worked in office.

July 7th. Temperature; plus 38 rising to 56. Fine warm day dead calm. The mosquitoes very bad today working outside a misery. Finished painting the inside of the skiff. Then worked at odd jobs such as cleaning the kitchen stove and cleaning up. Worked in Office after supper.

July 8th. Temperature; plus 34 rising to 38. Cool foggy day with strong West wind in afternoon and evening. Painted the counters of the store and baked a batch of bread. In evening Nels and I held a hair cutting bee.

July 9th. Temperature; plus 34 rising to 52. Fine warm day, hundreds of mosquitoes. Mr Chitty brought down his account so I finished off the inventory. Nels came down for supper then we went Tom God fishing no fish to wary yet.

July

36

July 10th Temperature; plus 38 rising to 60 Heavy rain early this morning then turned very hazy with thunder over Victoria Land. Worked all day on returns will finish tomorrow. Nels and Johnny went out sealing for the last time and took up all their nets, the ice is getting to cut up for the dogs.

July 11th; Temperature; plus 42 rising to plus 48. Fine cool day. Finished all the 266 returns and closed June accounts to mail when the plane comes for the C.T.C. fur which should be round the 21st. The ice in the inner bay begins to break as if might go to bits soon for it is full of holes and cracks.

July 12th. Temperature; plus 38 rising to 42. Dull day. Finished all office work on hand and then cleared the house of all small stuff for begin painting tomorrow.

July 13th; Temperature; plus 38 rising to 48. Raining hard all day. The inner harbour broke across opposite the C.T.C. this morning. Cleaned the stove pipes and took the lids off stove and gave it a real cleaning. Started to paint the inside of house gave ceiling first coat.

July 14th; Temperature; plus 34 rising to plus 48. Misty with rain on and off all day. Painted all the windows white.

July 15th temperature; plus 33 rising to 60. Warm sunny day, millions of mosquitoes after the rain. painted ceiling second coat.

July 16th Temperature; plus 40 to 58. Warm sunny day east wind. The ice in inner harbour clear from the east end to the H.B.C. painted the walls. In evening went Tom Cod fishing thousands in the bay. J.T. caught over 400 and was splitting them

July 17th; Temperature; plus 40 rising to 47. Warm overcast day East breeze.

Painted the lower half of the walls and the furniture
A good job one can work in doors these days as the flies
are as bad as at Tuktoyaktuk, and worse than I have seen in
the gulf.

July 18th. Temperature; plus 34 rising to 56. East wind clear. Finished all the
trims etc in the house today . Mr Chitty very nearly finish
-ed painting his house too.

July 19th. Temperature; plus 42 rising to 52. warm in forenoon but after V.B.K
it fogged up and turned cooler thus getting rid of the flies
for a while and giving the dogs a chance. Started to straight
-en the house arranged it differently and for an married
couple it will be better. Cleaned stove and painted the bed
-stands.

July 20th. Temperature; plus 36 rising to 56 Fine sunn day Cool towards evening
with slight fog. The ice in the inner harbour has been
gone for the last couple of days. The ice in outer harbour
is begining to look sickly and many holes and small cracks
have appeared today . Finished off the house, put up curtains,
washed tables and china shelves, in evening washed floors.
Set bread tonight.

July 21st. Temperature; plus 34 rising to plus 56. Fine sunny day strong West
wind. During the night the ice in the outer harbour made its
first move towards the East, the outside ice also moved a
little and pushed up on the west side of Igloolik. The mouth
of the river is wide open now and one can see open water all
round the islands at the mouth of the river.
Baked bread and painted porch finishing the painting for the
year.

July 22nd. Temperature; 34 rising to 36. Dull day with rain in afternoon. Finished up the last of the house cleaning jobs, the rest of the day spent cleaning up the yard and spreading fresh cinders round various buildings.

July 23rd. Temperature; 34 rising to 42 Fine sunny day with stiff West breeze. Finished cleaning up the yard and burnt some. Also filled the water barrels with ice. Washed pillow cases and towels. After supper worked for a while in the office. Mel came to supper.

July 24th Temperature; 32 rising to 50. Day began with then clouded up. Did a big wash in a.m. in afternoon began work on the new deck. Heard over V.R.K. that the Port James is going direct to Cambridge on her first trip due Wilmet Island August 8th. The ice in main North harbour is all broken up a good east wind will clear it out now.

July 25th. Temperature; 35 rising to 50 Fine sunny day Very little wind hundreds of Mosquitos. In forenoon helped the C.T.C. gang turn the whale boat over and run it down to the water. Then finished building the crib and got it in position and half filled with rocks. I find I have made it a little to high but it should settle when all the rocks are in.

July 26 th. Temperature. 34 rising to 52 Fine sunny day in evening it turned cool and foggy. Finished the wharf by evening then helped the C.T.C. launch the whale boat. Heard that a plane was at Coppermine and will be over tomorrow for the C.T.C. fur weather permitting.

July 27th. Temperature; The wind last night blew the thermometer to the ground and broke the glass so readings are not correct will give me until new thermometer arrives. Stormy in am clearing in evening Plane still at Coppermine. Making out 268 Requisitions.

July 28th.

Fine day scattered clouds, westerly wind. In afternoon the C. A. L. plane with Matt Berry as pilot arrived at the Island for the C.T.C. far he had as passengers the following, Dr Garth(?) a geologist, Mr Thomas the operator for the Dep. of Marine Wireless station at Coppermine and Messrs Norberg & V. Jeen the latter stayed to fix up the Cinderella and they will take the boat to Coppermine as soon as the ice permits. A large mail was handed over which was very welcome. The plane departed for Coppermine at 4:40 p.m. They reported solid ice to the West and in the gulf also that Mr Watson and his boat were still at Bernard Harbour. The local ice conditions are getting a little better for the outer harbour is clear of ice and it is clear to Avramma's place for in the evening he and his brood arrived for a visit followed by Alagumiak and Peytuk. They left in the early hours for their camps. The ice to the east is hard against the land and pretty solid due to the west winds of the last few days but with a good east wind the ice should move out.

July 29th.

Dull day slight west wind. Finished reading and filing the D.O. mail. Heard over V.R.K. that the Margaret A had left Tuk; for Coppermine. Wonder how far she will get with the ice solid to the west of this place and round Cape Boxl.

July 30th.

Fine day scattered clouds. Typed out 268 Requisitions.

July 31st

Fine day. West wind. Quite a lot of ice drifted in to the outer bay during the night from the west the outside ice still solid. Avramma arrived and got J. Norberg to fix up his motor launch which did not take long and they left soon after noon. Heard that Matt Berry picked up R. Jardine yesterday and left for outside this morning. R.C. Grubline also flew out. Finished the 268 requisitions today.

A U G U S T 36

Sat; 1st.

Fine in early a.m clouded up with slight rain in evening strong west wind. Lots of ice drifted in during the day from the west and blocked the west end of outer harbour. Nels in the whale boat tried to take down to Avramma's place Johnny one- armad wife and kids Mrs Johnny is due to have a child next week some time, they had to turn back due to ice. Closed the July books and finished off the requisitions.

Sun; 2nd

Another cold dull day with strong west wind. The outer harbour blocked with ice. Finished off all the office work today and am all ready for the boat. Put the C.T.C. cargo boat into the water and towed her round into inner bay.

Mon; 3rd;

Heavy rain all day cleared up in the evening and turned cold. Worked at odd jobs in and around the house. V.R.E. started the daily broadcasts today heard that Capt; Pedersen arrived at the Island yesterday. Also the St Roche was on her way to Coppermine. The Shawmagen left Coppermine for Reid Island today.

Tues; 4th;

Fine sunny day strong west wind. All morning the ice ran through the outer harbour to the east soon after noon it jamb and filled the outer harbour right full. After broadcast we went over to the south side of the island and had a look round. To the east the ice was jammed tight to the west and south west open water. The wind dropped towards night and it was dead calm by bed time. Heard that the shawmagen had turned back and was at Coppermine again, the St Roche and the Negalik were 40 miles from Cambridge Bay and in ice.

Finished banking up the North side of the house with gravel, then laid sods round east and north sides. A hair cutting bee down at Chittys in the evening.

Wed; 5th; Overcast with slight rain, west wind changing in evening to North. Ice conditions unchanged. No movements of boats in east and no word of the Margaret A. Did odd jobs around the house and in evening filled the water barrels with ice.

Thur; 6th; Fine day slight west wind. No change in the ice conditions. Worked at odd jobs in evening went Tom cod fishing.

Fri; 7th Fine day east wind all the ice on the move west the outer bay very near clear of ice. A gang from Rymer point arrived at noon the first time the have been over for over a month. William Napassaa, Avakosua, Chaituk, Mayak, and Hewjek made up the bunch. They traded and left round 6 o'clock. In the evening the weather turned to a steady rain. Heard that the M.A was tied up by ice at Keats Point and the St Roche had arrived at the Finlison Islands. Mat Berry and the mail arrived at noon today at Coppermine with two passengers who they were we were not told.

Sat; 8th. Fine windy day west wind. Heard over V.B.K. that the St Roche was at Turnagain Point, no news from the west. House cleaning the order of the day with work in the office in evening.

Sun; 10th Fine day wind shifting all round the compass in evening minx went to N.E. east and blew steady. Heard that the St Roche was off Wilmet Island no news of the Margaret A. In the evening Avakosua and family plus Ketekosua and wife blew in. They report no ice at all to the west and with this wind the ice will get moving west all along the North shore of Victoria Land. Messrs Norberg and Jess are ready to pull out for Coppermine in the morning.

- Mon; 10th Very fine day wind in the east turned to westerly in afternoon. Avraman and Botchkoos traded and then left for home in afternoon. After broadcast the U.2 with Messers Herberg & Joss on board left for Coppermine they only managed to get 10 miles east of Rymer Point and found the ice hard up on the shore with no leads through so they had to return and were back at Reid just after midnight.
- Tues; 11th Fine sunny day strong west wind. Heard that the police boat arrived at Coppermine at six o'clock last night. A wedding was held the Rev R. Thomas of Cambridge Bay was married then Mat Berry left for South. No news of any boat movements to the west and no news from the Margaret A or Lady of the Lourdes. Ole Anderson arrived in at Coppermine on the 10th. Messers Herberg & Joss are going to try to get over to the mainland by going west and crossing over by Avraman's place as the North shore route seems impossible now. Hugok blew in from Rymer Point with seal to trade.
- Weds; 12th Another very fine day the last few days have been the best this summer. South easterly breeze. Messers Herberg & Joss pulled out for their attempt to get over to mainland late last night and by 11 o'clock this evening we have seen nothing of them so we guess they made it. Worked at different jobs today in a.m. erected boundary post and painted sage after broadcast tore half of the new wharf down and rebuilt it made a stronger and better looking job. Heard that the Margaret A was off Buchanan River and in ice.
- Thurs; 13th; Dull overcast day wind North West. Did a wash in a.m then cleaned up North shore beach. Hugok blew in on his way back from Avraman's stayed a while and traded seal. Heard over V.R.K. that Herberg & Joss in the U.2 arrived at Coppermine at 1 p.m. today they report very little ice from the Sutton & Listen Islands into Coppermine. The Shingon is on the way to Reid, should be in tomorrow.

The supply ship "M.S. Fort James" arrived from Tuktoyaktuk via Coppermine about 6:30 PM. A NW breeze with frequent heavy snow flurries prevented us going ashore but we could see the the Canalaska schooner Niglets had been there and dumped her cargo on the beach about half a mile east of their post. The schooner Fox was also there, being pulled out. The inside harbor was frozen over. There were about ten natives around Canalaska post but no tents.

This was a very bad year for us. The M.S. Fort James worked us practically all the way and it took from the 11th of September to make the trip.

Among those on board were R. J. Summers Capt. Larry White dog engineer, Bill Starkes mate or steward #8 Mr. Sedgwick who was post manager here last outfit and who had gone out to Bathurst Island to get passage to Walker Bay where he was going to return Mr. C. V. Ross who was going outside on furlough failing to get passage he returned to Read Island and will work his way to Walker Bay by dog team. Mr. Ross and Mrs. Ross returned from furlough and will take over Read Island from Mr. Sedgwick.

Saturday 3

The weather is mostly clear with only a light NW breeze. We started unloading on to the beach a couple of hundred yards west of the house came ashore and engaged the natives who have been working for Canalaska. Mr. Chitty kindly granted me permission to take them. They were the same from Pelly Point and Ivaras place. Mr. Chitty had brought them here to help him. Mrs. Ross and I moved ashore tonight. The buildings and grounds are in a clean and orderly condition and it is a pleasure to be back and to be able to start in again just where I left off last summer.

Owing to antiquated equipment for unloading the vessel, we were unable to finish last night so we were up bright and early and on with the job.

There is an odd mix of old ice drifting about in the outside harbour, quite a lot on the beach and a lot of new slush ice in against the beach where we are unloading.

We finished lightering about four o'clock with every thing in the warehouse except coal oil & gas which was left on board for future consideration. The skipper & crew came ashore and drew their rations and expect to pull out in AM for Bernard Harbour to go in to winter quarters.

The natives are getting afraid of an early freeze up so I paid them off so they can pull out first thing in the morning. Cold and clear tonight

Monday 5th

Light northw. breeze and quite foggy

The M.S. Fort James hoisted anchor and away as soon as the fog lifted and the natives all got away but I am afraid they would not get far as new ice is forming fast. They will probably break their jolly boats on Victoria Land and walk home. The Fort James laboured around west in sight & hearing and towards evening they came back and anchored just off the east end of the island to the NE of Read Gold. The boat will be about 2 miles from the post judging by the look of the weather they will be there for the winter. Mr Sedgwick and I (Ray Ross) worked in the store opening goods, checking and pricing.

Tuesday 6

Clear & calm

The outside harbour froze over during night but there are quite a number of open holes. We went down and gave Mr Chitty a hand to pull his boat (MS Fox) out. I opened a thermometer today and it registers 10° above

We had a little snow on the island but today's wind seems to have blown every thing back again. We went down and helped Mr Chitty again with his boat. The Fort James is still at the same anchorage but has swung her bow from NE to NW. Ptarmigan seem to be very scarce so far this year.

Mr Sidgwick and I worked in the store opening goods. The Canadaska outfit was dumped on the beach about $\frac{3}{4}$ mile east of the post. They are busy hunting the stuff up to the post with dogs.

We worked in the store. Johnny Inkuk (C.T.C.) interpreter ran into a flock of about fifty ptarmigan today. Maybe we are going to get some here after all. The storm blew itself out and tonight it is practically calm with temperature unchanged.

We worked in the store all day. Harry White (Chief Engineer on Ft James) walked in to the post today. Evidently every one on the boat are getting nicely holed up for the winter. The ship is leaking about the same and it looks like a mess-mess for the spring.

We listened in to Coppermine Radio last night and zero-light East Angles heard Mr Bonny castle give a line up on the happenings during the Ice Age of the past summer. We worked in the store. Mr Sidgwick visited the Ft James. A couple of the crew were on Victoria land yesterday and reported many fox tracks.

Aurana & Pugtuk arrived from their camp 10 miles west and are helping Canaleaska haul their dogs from beach to ware house, (using dogs). With this game around, there are so many interruptions

Numeruna put snow runners on his sled today getting ready to pull out in the AM.

Saturday 17
NE breeze, clear, just
above zero

Numeruna, Unukok and Napogut left this morning for their camp in the sound. They are camped on a fish lake and report plenty of fish. I worked in the store while Mr Sledger hauled coal and gas etc down from the beach to store. The natives working for Canaleaska finished hauling supplies. Edmonton & Coppermine Radio came in good. -16° tonight

The ice in the harbour was about 12 to 14" thick around where the boat was cut out.

While we were pulling the boat out, Johnny Norberg arrived accompanied by two natives Koochuk and Annakona. Johnny left Coppermine with Fort James but a strong breeze compelled him to cut adrift around Tukerak and we had been wondering what had become of him. He arrived at Lady Franklin Point just east of his old camp. He pulled his boat out and came up here with dog.

Monday 19

zero - clear now b^y

We had Johnny, Koochuk & Annakona + Harry White for visitors today with the result that there was not much work done, however we did get the door covered on the outside with paper felt and tassas to prevent it frosting up on the inside. Mr Sedgwick packed some more freight while I cleaned up some odd jobs around the house.

Tuesday 20

Zero, light NW b^y

Mr Sedgwick and I hauled the balance of coal and gas down from beach. Just 160 coal remain there.

Johnny Norberg, Koochuk and Annakona with Wm Kuptana who arrived on 17th returned to their camps to east

We were engaged in hauling coal today. The skipper paid a visit Coppermine radio wood. Mr Chitty pay a visit. Very few planes have made their appearance so far. The sedgwick visitors the boat + sets a batch of bread for them and will go back tomorrow to take it.

We left 45 sacks on the beach. The coal on hand is some of the 265 coal that was shipped from W.W. last outfit and is certainly too much stuff to melt. More ptarmigan seem to be appearing from the north but they are very wild.

Saturday 24

We built a stage using the can & a couple of gas drums with angle iron for platform and put our seal & dry fish on it. We prepared some old lumber & made a frame work over the coal adjoining the house. The door to canvas covered shed adjoining store and used as seal house & for storing odds and ends finally came adrift from its moorings & was in too bad shape to repair so Mr. Sedgwick hung the old door off house in its place.

We covered the coal with an old sail belonging to a native whale boat. If the Commissioner were to pay us a visit & see all the makeshift houses around the lot I think it would not be long till some lumber were shipped in. I cleaned up around the store. Red hauled ice. Harry White visited.

The Canalaska get theirs in tar and it comes in in good shape. There is either poor packing in Edmonton or it is the trip down the river that puts it off colour. The two native families that were camped here, pulled out this morning for trap lines. They intend fishing for a while so will be gone a couple of weeks. There is sufficient draft around the house to start a snow wall. Harry White visits and stays the night.

Some snow fell & with the haze, Harry decided to spend another day with us as he could easily miss the boat. V.B.K informed us that plane was at Cameron Bay. It is not expected that it will be over here or to Sleepy Hollow Bay.

A group of Prince Albert Sound natives arrived this evening I have not seen them as they are camped over at Canalaska. Kekok who quite trading here last year is there also E. Kotuk Okhina & Joe Kuptana. E. Kotuk & Okhina were men whom Mr. Sidgwick said had quit Canalaska last year and joined the Company, possibly it was only on the strength of getting a flock of debt

We have been in complete touch with world events especially the critical condition surrounding the throne Today King Edward abdicated in favor of the Duke of York who will be proclaimed King George VI tomorrow.

Saturday 12

-29° Clear Calm

My thermometer is all haywire again. 21 yrs separations with liquid and bubbles down in the bulb. So that readings are anything but accurate. I fixed it again but it is not worth using so I will omit temperatures.

The natives in addition to ones mentioned yesterday are, Nelson and Sam. There are more natives coming here from P.A.S. and some of them are going to stay for Christmas. They have practically no fur

The natives are very quiet. They are going to remain here till Christmas but God only knows what they and their dogs are going to live on.

They will have to do better than they have done so far in order to get sufficient supplies to last them. William Kuptana and his partner Pooytuk returned from a seven day trap line with a skunk.

Larry & Chitty visited today. Koochuktuk the native who took the Sledge has not shown up yet. He is about due to return (date) Kooteekantuk late this afternoon after having delivered the sleds to Numerana camp on Prince Albert Sound. Numerana will deliver him to Ikey Bolts camp & then Ikey will see that he gets through to Ft. Collinson. Light easterly breeze getting up tonight.

Wednesday 15
-2° West. E. gale.

Very strong easterly wind with drifting. The natives are very quiet today - we had only 1 visitor (Kabot). The wind appeared to be easing up late tonight.

Thursday 17
-16° Clear W. breeze

Hougot returned late last evening from a trip to Rymer Point for dog feed. The breeze has hauled right around to day and from the looks of the moon we are in for some cold weather.

The natives from Points east arrived today. Johnny Norberg & wife from Lady Franklin Point, Friday Harbor Kekpuk, Amos, and another chap who lives with Billy Joss. Kabogok, Koobtana, Okaituk from Rymer Point.

This is a very quiet year in the store. No debt is being collected as the natives require the small amount of fur they turn for necessities. The natives are all cleaning down at Canadian house tonight.

Mr Webster arrived about 11 P.M. having come over the portage to P.A.S. in two days (one stop)

Hazy and snowing most of day. Harry was in to the post this evening. Harry is still at Coppermine. Rudy Stevens & pilot of the plane that went to Cambridge returned to Coppermine.

Monday 12
Cloudy some snow

The natives were sailing but had no luck again. Harry was in this evening ^{and} was talking to Chet Goss & Akbarik on short wave. The plane and Johnny Carson are still at Coppermine.

Tuesday 13
Strong E. wind
heavy drifting

None of the natives left town today owing to the storm. There is a lot of soft snow around now making travelling difficult.

Wednesday 14
Cloudy calm mild

Today has been the mildest day this year. The first ice ceiling in store started to drop. George arrived at Coppermine yesterday & going down E.P.

Thursday 15
O'cast NE bogs, mild

Two local natives have been working with the O'cast NE bogs, mild crew of St James shoveling snow, yesterday and today they finished the snow & have started to drag a trail in the ice. They Bolt arrived late this evening accompanied by Avakona, Bob, Diamond & Malrobok.

Friday 16
O'cast calm, mild
some snow at night

Arranna and his family arrived. He is going on the boat out to travel around the boat today and expect to start snowing tomorrow.

Saturday 17
overcast AM clear

Entomia arrived today. Smoke stack visited from Ryd

Monday 18 John was & visited the fort James in evening.
Clear, calm wind. John's wagon arrived back from Coppermine in
evening with mail.

Monday 19
O'cast. Calm wind A young fellow who lives with Nickyukuk at Coppermine
arrived with a caribou. A gang from Prince Albert
Sound arrived. Amokok, Kyak, Kalok, Pannashuk, Monayuk,
Anuvik, Horduk, Jacob with wives and families. Anuk
has returned to the field after being a deserter for last
several years.

Tuesday 20 Mr Webster & his native Tefluk arrived about sun-
this evening and held a service this evening. He is
staying with me but holds service at Cannanuk as far
as I would prefer the striking here my place
except all in here at once

Wednesday 21 The weather continues rather hazy but cool. Some of
O'cast N.E. breeze drifly. Our visitors are making preparations to depart in the
morning weather permitting.

Thursday 22 Mr Gkey Bolt, and three of his men left for their camp
Clear in AM. O'cast. in PM- calm today also two men the Canadiana sent to Nukuk
Buy to get fur & the Post manager Bob M. Isaac. Two
more teams arrived from P.A.S. Andluk & Paluk

Friday 23 Andluk and Paluk arrived from P.A. Sound today
Mr Webster is still providing out his three services a day and
making them like it.

Saturday 24 Mr Webster left this afternoon for Coppermine accompanied
by several families who are going part way. Tedluak
Nuvik & P. Kortuk arrived from P.A. Sound.

Sunday 26
Clear, calm, mild.

Kuluk left for P.A.S. The gang from the boat were in for a visit today. The visiting natives are getting less in dog fuel so they should be moving back to their camps soon. The radio has been good up till a couple of days ago, and last night I could not hear a sound from E.C.H.A. at midnight though I did hear them earlier in the evening.

Monday 26
Clear.

Most of the natives are preparing to get away in the morning. Etotokina left today & Aviana arrived.

Tuesday 27
Clear, N.E. breeze, drift

Aviana left for a visit to Coppermine. Kuganguit and a number of other natives left for P.M.S. Moniowit returned from Kresserton where he had been working. Tippenny accompanied him back, having just come off the land at Kuganguit.

Wednesday 28
Cloudy, N.E. breeze

Avakoria & Smokestack (K. I. agok) returned from Lyman Point. We are losing some of our hunters. Kuganguit is going up with Skeg's outfit. Kookaboo is also going up that way. Hwangok, Myngok, Kuchuktas and Etotokina going on the land at Coppermine & Kuganguit country.

Thursday 29
Cloudy N.E. wind
snow.

Jacob and Kutchuk left this morning for their camp up near Skeg's place. The radio has been very poor for the last week or so, even the short wave does not function so that a code message received last Thursday has not yet been decoded because we have been unable to get in touch with Charlie Read.

Friday 30.
Cloudy, calm, mild.

Avakoria, Smokestack, Moniowit, Peter, Kowinuit, Hoolowok, left this morning, all going up north along the coast - the last week or so the temperature has been up around 20-25° above during day and goes down to about 10° at night.

Saturday 1st
Ocast, cool, calm

The last few days have been very dull. The temperatures have been mild but not thawing in the shade.

Sunday 2.
Ocast and light N.E.
breeze

Merry Happy and Prosperous Returns of the Day
Hudson's Bay Company.

Houyok and Nyusk left today for Coppermine. They intend going inland around Dismal Lakes for the summer.

Monday 3.
Clear, warm, fog
in evening.

Ekautek and David Kooikiana arrived from Bymer Point. They returned their traps in a jolly boat. They are now off for inland. David going east to somewhere in Bathurst Inlet where they will head inland and come out at Kugaryuk. Ekautek is going on to around dismal lakes.

Tuesday 4
Clear - Strong N.E.
breeze - drifting
Gale force tonight

The skipper of fort James paid a visit to me on the account for supplies to his boat. The only two natives around now are Ekautek and Tukivanna. They will probably spend the summer around here.

Wednesday 5
Overcast. Howling N.E.
gale getting gusty tents

The gale that started yesterday was still blowing hard this morning. The 90 ft mast I had for wind power crashed over on the house at 9 a.m. It broke in two places and is beyond repair unless strengthened and rebuilt.

Thursday 6
Clear - calm cool.

Uligonuk & son visited. Harry got in touch with Coppermine tonight for first time in two weeks but I still do not know what the code message was about.

Friday 7.
Clear, light E. breeze
cool.

The Coppermine radio came on good - they told us of the burning of the zip at Lakehurst - Maria and I went hunting for a seal hunt with one seal - they had been away during the blow.

January 7
37

Saturday 8
Partly clear but some snow. Windy.

The weather is still unsettled. we are getting a still NW breeze with a ground drift temperature rises from -5° to 12° above. Two sleds arrived tonight. Both owned and operated by Algeak who has a house of sorts to the west around Williams point where he is going to spend the Summer after being at Coppermine for the last three years.

Sunday 9
Clear. NW breeze with ground drift.

Algeak and his wife and two sons paid a visit today and had to dig them selves in as front door was drifted over half way up. The boys did not like it & Skypa visited.

Monday 10
Clear calm mild

I went out and picked up my traps which had just been sprung at end of season. Some snow ptarmigan (Algeak's best bird) pulled out this forenoon for Williams. Topooma arrived from P.A.S., Etorkina visited and Avanna returned from Coppermine.

Tuesday 11
Clear, calm mild

Avanna left for his place T. In. in evening. Poor King had a baby girl the other day.

Wednesday 12
NW breeze. clear. cool

William Kuptana accompanied by Bob McIsaac arrived from Walker Bay. They report that Mr. Sedgwick will be down here later to go west on Fort James.

Thursday 13.
Clear NE breeze. Snowing in afternoon. Clear for night.

Three teams arrives from P.A.S. early this AM. Kekuk Kuptana, Parimuluk & Ootunguk. Minnernak had been ill in recovery. Ootunguk worked in the bush with 22 long by a long. but seems to be more the worse for it.

Friday 14
Cloudy, NE wind

Snow fell during the night & it is blowing and drifting to beat the band. Johnnie Norberg arrived in the early hours. We visited Coppermine on the short walk last night but put new batteries in and got them to run all day.

Saturday 15
Clear, calm cool

Johnny Norberg visited & paid his account & borrowed a sled to be returned by Canalaska. He will be leaving Monday for Coppermine with Canalaska fur.

Sunday 16
Ocast NW breeze cool

We have had only 1 warm day so far. The snow has melted considerably but has not started to disappear off the land yet. Friday & two men arrived tonight from Coppermine. He says it is still winter over there and quite warm at 45°.

Monday 17
Ocast calm cool

Johnny Norberg & Friday were supposed to leave today with mail & fur, but they did not get away.

Tuesday 18
Ocast calm mild

Friday pulled out for Coppermine about noon and Johnny left in the evening. Beaumie visited.

Wednesday 19
Ocast NE breeze cool

Most of the natives are away working as there are none living around the Company. I can not keep track of them.

Thursday 20
Clear, calm, mild

I have some flower plants growing in the house and I put them out in the sun today, the first time it has been warm enough.

Friday 21
Clear NE breeze cool

Johnny Norberg arrived at Coppermine today. Too cold to put the plants out.

Saturday 22
Ocast NW breeze cool

We get some station news on the radio around midnight but I could not hear Edmonton tonight.

Sunday 23
Ocast, calm, mild

Kinnikinnik arrived from Kuugjuaq this morning. He will bring around these parts this year. Snow fell today - first I have seen this season.

Wednesday 26 The C. & G. men left for Rymer Point today. Nelson and wife - with Knutson, Arrane, Elsieck and Taptona. They will make their summer headquarters there.

Thursday 27 Wind calm cool Today has been visitor day. Mr. captain, Harry Chitty and wife were over this evening.

Wednesday 26 O'cast ~~calm~~ cool Kinnekin and his family left for Arrane's place. We have had practically no warm weather yet, most days it is thawing in the sun but goes very fast above freezing with shade. The snow around the buildings is melting and turning to ice but there is no water around yet.

Thursday 27 O'cast. N.E. breeze cool Very quiet around here with no visiting visitors. Johny, Gussie and Joe Elsieck are the only visitors here having year over.

Friday 28 O'cast. Calm - wind Some snow tonight I visited the boat today. Mr. Sedgwick arrived from Fort Robinson tonight accompanied by "meat". He has closed Walker Bay Post and will go west on Ft. James.

Saturday 29 O'cast. W. Breeze, cool Mr. Sedgwick and I dined at Canalside this evening. It is reported that around Minto Inlet the snow has all gone and they have ducks and geese. Chitty heard geese here.

Sunday 30 O'cast. N.W. breeze cool ready for painting. Mr. Sedgwick paid a visit to Ft. James.

Monday 31 Windy Monday Windy, calm Jack left for his return to his trapping camp. Johny & Joe returned from walking with one seal between them. Wm. Kephart writer from Rymer Point.

The night opened with nothing very exciting happening. I have waited to get a harp seal and Mr Chitty was here for a while in evening he says that Johnny saw some seals swimming out on the ice - so far we have not seen any here. There are gulls and numerous small birds around - no penguins.

Wednesday 2
Cloudy - wind N.E.
bright & foggy

Bob S. and I are working on our respective books. It has been a beast of a day with a strong wind that started from N.E. and kept blowing around till now it is in N.W. It was drifting & barely thawing in sun 82° of frost tonight.

Thursday 3.
Ocast NW gate mid

A howling gale with heavy drifting could not see the sun this morning. It cleared up about noon & blew hard and down at night.

Friday June 4
Ocast light drizzle
Clear calendar today

Joe & the Skipper worked for supplies this morning. The Ocast light drizzle weather cleared up about noon and the wind died about 40°. The snow disappeared rapidly and small pools of water appeared on the ice in the inner harbor. Kinnikinnik arrived from Aransas this evening. He reported four lemmings.

Saturday 5
Clear calm n.E.

Clear weather prevails again and making the snow vanish. Kinnikinnik says there is a small creek about a foot wide between here & Aransas, the only one he has seen around here. He was out sealing over 3 hours.

Sunday 6
Ocast calm foggy

It has been no roads for days now. Johnny Hulberg arrived back from Copetonis late this evening. Quite a number of Arctic and Brent flying around some now.

Monday 7.
Mostly clear mild

Heavy wind over a week in touch with Apparatus and the land is blowing up more & more with snow.

Johny Parker pulled out for his camp about now.
The amount of water all over the ice now and very little
snow. The snow on the land are the remains of drifts.

Karukukuk arrived back from a seal and wood hunt. He
got three seal but was unable to get on the Chukchi or Lektor
estuaries owing to deep water on the ice in the night ice.

Thursday 10
Very cold and
windy cool. It's
very cool but sunny in the sun - freezing at night.
Chilly & MacLean were over for dinner this evening. We cleaned
up one leg of pork that I had sent up here during winter.
The water is rapidly running off the ice.

Sunday 11
Clear N.E. by cool. We
have been busy on our books the last few days - Mr
Grayson has finally finished Walker Bay accounts.
I still have plenty to do on this part of the account.
Information that a polar bear has been killed.

Saturday 12
Very cool and
windy cool. Cyril Wengrik and family arrived late last night from
Bellot and Inuit. He will join the Fort James crew. Accompanying
him from Resolute Point were P. Berluk, Kilavane and Wm Knutson.
Mrs. Berluk's bitch produced another litter of pups. It is
eight months to a day since she had the last lot.

Monday 13
Very cool and
windy cool. Mrs. Berluk's bitch had 13 pups (about a bushel and a half).
She has been gradually all run off the ice. She now
has a small hole in the ice and will do as captain of
the ship. She is a good mother and it was lovely to see her.

Wednesday 16
Clear, NE breeze cool
and following

We were here again - the male population at Caramona found time to visit. Caramona, Etukokua, Alagomnick, Peuglak and Son. They left again about seven PM.

Thursday 17
Clear, NE breeze warm

The gang from Canadaska, Fort Jones and here joined forces and went over to the island south of the eastern end of Red Island called locally Igloolik and erected a brazier which had previously been prepared by Mr Chitty. It is a triangle made of about 12 boards on a 40 ft mast facing south. It will be an aid to boats during navigation season. When we returned we found Caramona back again with a porpoised hand. The Coppermine told us that this river he went out on Monday. A birds nest had four eggs in it.

Friday 18
Clear, NE breeze warm

Harry had a talk with Coppermine yet awaiting news on the way of news. The Canadaska found their cargo boat - she'd got frozen in last fall & was cut out & landed upon the ice where it stayed all winter.

Saturday 19
Clear, NE breeze - warm

A warm NE breeze has been blowing the last couple of days with bright sunshines at shore so far as nothing like snow down. There was 64° at the boat just in other day. Fishermen blown from his seal camp, during night and returned today.

Sunday 20
Clear, calm warm

This has been a real summer day. Every one went fishing for tomcod this evening catching birds of these. A journey arrived last Wednesday from Bernard Harbor consisting of the widow of Attagutik and her son and a girl.

Monday 21
Cloudy, cooler cooler

It was quite warm all day but the evening came up cloudy and got colder looks like we were in for a storm.

Sunday 21
Cloudy & drizzling,
cold.

Joe Etterick left this evening for Bernard Harbor where they will get the old records from which we can get up Grinnell's account which he is disputing over now.

Monday 22.
Cloudy foggy, snowy
NW breeze.

I baked a batch of bread, taking advantage of the cool weather and washed the curtains. Mr. McNamee & Mrs. Chitty visited this evening.

Wednesday 23
Cloudy N.E. breeze
Snowy & foggy cold.

Scrubbed out today, preparing to paint outside. The land is practically dry even the puddles that are generally here as have dried up. There is still a bit of open water along the shore and you need a boat to get out on the ice even at low water. Painted outside.

Thursday 24.
Clear N.E. breeze warm

Arrana who came in a few days ago with a gun, fallen swollen hand was said it was gun shot from a pistol from a seal pupper - after prodding it for a couple of days I came to the conclusion that it was a strain and not poison.

Friday 25.
Clear E. breeze warm

I inspected Mr. Etterick's bark from Bernard Harbor but they must have found the rough sea harder to navigate than they anticipated. I painted the ceiling second and last coat. Mr. Chitty is also painting the inside of his house. Arrana left for time.

Saturday 26
Cloudy S.E. breeze warm

Two of Arrana's dogs wandered in this today. I was flying kites, put in new window panes which had been cracked ever since the place was built, and the great amount of the others.

Sunday 27
Cloudy & cool, N.E. breeze

Joe Etterick came back from Bernard Harbor early this morning, repairing very tough owing to old rough

July 27

25. Saturday morning this AM. - there is quite high water so
the ice is moving and the wind is cutting West winds somewhere. Harry was up

Saturday 26. There was a few moosebites around this morning. The
wind was very calm. Skipper and Joe visited and did some shopping.

Wednesday 30. We painted the walls & baseboard or wallcovering and
then did some more painting. Clear calm warm well then just have the trim to do.

July. 1937

Thursday 1. We straightened the house out today and can move
around once more this painting business just turns
the house upside down.

Friday 2. We finished the trim or our painting for this year and
over. and we can get back in the books once more.
The batteries on the radio for a day, put out and wind we
cannot even hear. Copperman.

Saturday 3. The ice in the inner harbour broke off by Comaluksha
first variable breeze and drifted down to the foot of the bay. The balloon
moved over to this shore. This is about 1/2 days
earlier than last year.

Sunday 4. The ice in the inner harbour broke off the stumps and
came out about 100 feet. The big ice is still however
several times more west a bit & has piled up on a reef.
I got some old batteries & have the radio OK again.

Monday 5. Harry was gone but failed to contact Copperman. He
was still hunting around town. The skipper, Billie
and I went into town to do some shopping. The
weather was still bad.

Wednesday 6. I believe inner harbour is badly broken up
and may completely disappear in another day or two.
A few bergs are around this morning.

Wednesday 7.

Clear, calm, warm.

There is just a small patch of ice in the inner harbour

airplane landing. VBR told us that things are opening
up at Coppermine & the Amery ice pack to get away in
ten days or two weeks. Things are also opening up at
Cambridge Bay with a couple of miles of open water.
Radio on the broadcast band has been coming in
around midnight with good volume considering
the time of year.

Thursday 8

Clear, calm, warm

A real summer day. We should not be out sun-
bathing today as there are not many days like today
in a year. The Chilly is passing the outside of the
house.

Friday 9.

Clear, calm, warm.

Coppermine radio told us the Copeland was at tuckits
with two ice in sight & no break.

Saturday 10

Clear, calm, warm

This makes three days of summer at any rate.
There is no more ice left. It can get cloudy at night. The
Fort Jones broke loose in the ice & swam around.

Sunday 11.

Partly cloudy, light

wind, large, warm

Larry what rowed in from Ft. Jones, said he followed a
crack till he gotten to the open water around the island.
He took my radio short wave set and will carry
it on the boat to hammer. I started to rebuild the mast.

Monday 12.

Cloudy, light, warm

The Americans were here in greater numbers today.
Capt. Clegg & his mate rowed in this morning. We had
a few talks.

July

7

Monday 13 Chitty has been working down at his schooner the last few days, painting etc - Today he started it into the water. Plenty of mosquitoes again today (that is by Read Is. standards, not Mc Tigue River) The Tom Cod have been scarce the last few days but Mr Sedgwick caught a flock this evening.

Wednesday 14
Clear lighter. breezy
warm

Another fine Summer day. quite a few mosquitoes - The Fort Jones pulled up anchor & disappeared - I think she went on to that harbour about seven miles to east. The Coppermine had no news.

Thursday 15
Clear - light N.E. breezy. Warm

Kumuktuk and Ebrok left by jolly boat for Avannah place a couple of days ago. There is only a small neck of ice to cross and then they will be over into the water along the shore.

Friday 16
Clear lighter. breezy warm

The Chitty is still working on his schooner Fox Moose. Mc Isaac & Sedgwick are helping him. Kumuktuk arrived back today. He brought the feed line from Avannah's boat with a couple of its fitting broken. Poor Avannah seems to break something or get it put on back to front ever year when he overhauls his boat. V.B.K said that they were expecting a couple of planes in about the end of the week - one from each company. The "Audrey B" is expected to leave about Sunday - St Rock is expected to be able to leave in about ten days from Cambridge.

Saturday 17
Cloudy & very warm

All the ice on the roadstead seemed to move last night so that there is open water from as far east as we can see to the house. That old ice was pretty rotten anyway. By night I could see no ice to westward. The ice outside of course had not moved yet. Harry & Bill Starkes were in with the launch.

July 27

Sunday 18.

Cloudy

Most of the ice that broke up in the outer harbour and shifted to westward yesterday is back with us today. There are a lot of patches of ice in the outer harbour now. V.B.K. said the "Audrey B" were leaving today for here. A McKenzie plane arrived last night at Coppermine - they evidently have the new mail contract starting in November.

Monday 19

Most cloudy. some short heavy showers
Light breeze. warm

The Fort James moved back to Read Island again - the crew came ashore in the launch & picked up the fur & goods being shipped. Chitty got his sloop off the beach and brought it around to the inner harbour.

Tuesday 20

Clear & breezy. warm

This northwesterly breeze has cleared all the ice out between here and the mainland and we can see open water along the S. side of Read Island around Igloolik. Capt Summers left word that if conditions were favourable he would leave tomorrow. A gang of natives arrived from Arvans.

Wednesday 21

All day clear

Johnny Norberg & William Kuptana arrived - Johnny was on his way here from Lady Franklin Point but the ice came in and he had to leave his boat a few miles east of here & come in with a kicker & flyboat. The Fort James left about noon Mr Sedgwick accompanying them. They worked away out in the ice and were back here at anchor again at four PM - Avans & his gang left.

Thursday 22

Cloudy, warm

Mr Chitty took Johnny Norberg, William & Tapstone to Johnny's boat this evening. Johnny will go back & down to Coppermine.

Friday 23

Cloudy. warm

The Flyer left some time between 4 AM & 7 AM. It looks as though they were really on their way this time. Avans & family wanted & departed - We never have any fun - the Flyer returned again this afternoon.

July

37

9

Wednesday 24 The Fort James is still anchored down to east near the Chukchi Islands and of the Island - I visited there this evening when Larry White had a sled with Tuk-tuk but failed to contact them. Bill Starker & Mr. Sugarsick visited ashore this evening. Radio was pretty good tonight heard the whole of C.J.C.A. program.

Sunday 25
Clear NE breeze warm

There is a good stiff breeze blowing and it looks as though it would move the ice. A lot of ice coming into outside harbour so Ft James had to move farther east. Larry White visited.

Monday 26
NE breeze. Wind cool

A heavy rain fell during the night. The wind blew steady all day but died out in evening

Tuesday 27
Occas. NE breeze cont.

The Fort James left early this AM but only got out as far as Okakuk Islands where she ran into heavy unbroken ice. The Police boat holed up at Tree River on account of fog but was expected to arrive at Coppermine tonight. The "Audrey B" which left Coppermine some time ago arrived back there again after being gone about eight days heavy ice prevented them going very far. The mail plane arrived at Coppermine today.

Wednesday 28
Clear, light breeze warm

The ice to the south of the island has come right back up tight again. The St. Roch & Tuk-tuk arrived at Coppermine late last night - The Fort James was 10 miles W. of the Okakkuk.

Thursday 29
Occas. fresh N.W. breeze cool

The St. Roch got to Bernard Harbour - The Ft. James did not move owing to heavy unbroken ice. There is a lot of pretty heavy ice in the outside harbour and the mouth of the inner harbour is covered with heavy grounded ice.

July 29

Monday 28 The St. John's drifited back to Kingerton. The St. James was still over near Barley with a damaged rudder & bent propeller. They seem to be moving & getting to the edge of the ice. The "Audrey B" is supposed to have passed on the north side of the ice & to be away out in clear going.

Saturday 31. The Coppermine Radio told us today that The St. James was off Hope Thompson Point so she should be at Resolute tomorrow. The St. Roche had left Kingster - stern was in heavy ice in the Straits. We can see no ice now from the buildings.

August

Sunday 1 Chilly cloudy - SW breeze cont. I have missed a day somewhere what I have down for 31 July should be Aug 1st. Mr. Chitty Plans on leaving in the morning for Tukluk.

Monday 2. That was a false report about position of St. James, she is only around Hope Point & the St. Roche is right on her tail. Mr. Chitty left at 5 PM this evening with John Takkuk on the Sloop Fox, for Herschel. Beautifully calm tonight - caught lots of Tom cod.

Tuesday 3 This morning the outer harbor was full of ice that came in from east. by evening it had scattered some

Wednesday 4 Kenneth & William Kuptane returned from Arviat where they had been visiting. William left again in evening for Resolute Point. Not calm tonight. The Police boat & St. James had to turn around Barley tied up to ground ice on a ft. 5 of water.

August

Thursday 5 The glass is very low 29.25 and we had a heavy rain storm all morning. Mr Chitty arrived back again evidently the ice has not moved out yet. The NE breeze died out and a gentle breeze from NW sprang up. We are getting very high tides and they are getting a strong gale at Coppermine so it looks as though we were in for it too. - At 10:30 tonight I picked up the St Rock radio trying to get in touch with Coppermine they said the St James had been squeezed & was sinking. The crew had been picked up by the St Rock. They were still calling V.B.K. at midnight.

Friday 6
NW wind. cool.
Rain, snow mist

A real fall storm is raging. V.B.K. mentioned about the St James sinking off Béland Harbour & the St. Rock was somewhere near Kruenstein. The wind & ice evidently drifting them all the way from Beekley. V.B.K. did not say anything about the fur or seal - ring (257) returns were aboard and w6 & W3 fur - 6 Bales.

Saturday 7.
NW breeze. cool

The N.W. storm is still with us but is showing signs of slackening off and the glass is going up to normal. A plane went to Cambridge Bay with Ruship Flemming. The Governor General and party paid a flying visit to Coppermine. Mr Bonycastle was evidently with the party. The St Rock arrived back at Coppermine this morning after breaking the ice as far as Beekley & then getting picked all the way back again.

Sunday 8
SW breeze. cool, cold

The MS Clinton arrived this forenoon. She went from Bathurst Inlet (leaving the "Audrey" from Kruenstein part way) to Nelson Head. but could not get to westward account ice. According to Chippy however he took an awful beating in the ice till Audrey slipped through a lead which took up half the Clinton got up to it.

Reed Island

12

August

Monday 9
Cloudy, calm.

A band of ice blew up tight to the south side of the island yesterday and started to come in to the outer harbour last evening - The Chinook moved in to the inner harbour where she will have repairs made to rudder and prop. The boats left Coppermine this morning for various places - St Rock, Nigalik, Tadlik, Eagle & Sea Wolf.

Tuesday 10
Clear, calm, mild.

The outer harbour is still full of ice and there is ice as far as we can see in all directions. Fog came in tonight and new ice is forming. The outer harbour is completely frozen over along the shore and there is new ice in inner harbour. The St Rock & the other boats had not reached Kruenstein at noon.

Wednesday 11
Cloudy, SW breeze
Cool. Fog hung around all day.

The new ice that formed last night all disappeared when the breeze sprang up - The boats that left Coppermine a few days ago are still around dead man's island that is between Kruenstein & Coppermine.

Thursday 12
Cloudy. W. breeze.

The weather is cold & miserable more like a winter from now. There was no word about the boats today. The Chinook is still here undergoing repairs to propeller & rudder.

Friday 13
Cloudy. SW. breeze. mild

The hard luck ditched out today seemed of no worse variety than usual. The boats were still on the other side of Kruenstein in heavy ice. This afternoon a small schooner was sighted coming from NW along coast. It was making slow time & we soon lost sight of it, probably behind an island. They did not arrive. We presume it is stuck fast in Rob Roy.

August

Saturday 14
Windy light variable
breaks from N.W. N.W.
Clear at night.

When I got up two marts were seen to south near the shore of the Island I presume it is the boat we sighted yesterday but cannot figure what they are doing there. The people from the boat mentioned above - walked over the island & proved to be Ekey Bolt & A. Klenzenberg. George Avakina & a couple of women & two children. Late tonight they brought the boat Rob Roy now called "Jane B" around to outer harbour. Received word today that my wife presented me with a bouncing baby boy born yesterday Friday 13th 11:05 PM. We said that was an unlucky day. Mother and baby are doing well and father is not complaining.

Sunday 15
Clear N.W. breeze

The boats are still at Kruenstein & there is no further word of the "Audrey B". The Schooner Atlantic arrived back at Cambridge Bay from Perry River. Capt Leonard of the Schooner Birchwood bought his outfit from here. I would like to point out here the advantage of having a decent well assorted stock on hand between end of May and when the new outfit arrives. There is always fur to be picked up in the Summer before arrival of supplies and generally the profit on those sales will exceed more than pay interest on capital. If my inventory had been down to where District Office always wants it to be, I would not have been able to supply Leonard and he would have taken his fur to Canadaska where they always seem to have good stocks on hand.

Monday 16
Mostly clear
light N. breeze.

The boats from Kruenstein left this morning & were making good time with no ice ahead. Johnny Norberg arrived from Coppermine with our mail. The Canadaska dog Team also arrived. Three boats are now anchored in the outside harbour as the mouth of inside harbour is blocked with ice.

16

Wednesday 17
Clear light W. Breeze

The St. Roche was at Keats point last night. The "Audrey B" arrived Cambridge last evening so it looks a bit brighter for an outfit this year.

Wednesday 18
Clear, practically
calm

The Outer harbour is still full of ice & there is ice out side as far as we can see but it looks as though there was a good lead so the Fox & Chinook worked their way out of the inner harbour about 4 PM & anchored out with the fleet. At six PM they all decided to move Johnny Norbury with Eagle going to Walker Bay, They Bolt with "Jane B." for Minto Inlet. Capt Leonard in Chinook going to Coppermine, Mr Chitty in "Fox" going west to Norton River and the Judah with Angalabik & Mr Mc Isaac going to King William Land. Going out of here Johnny Norbury took his paddler & was delayed several hours the Chinook & Fox waited & gave him a hand repairing. Several natives have been in the last few days with jolly boats.

Thursday 19
Clear calm

New ice formed all over the outer harbour & remained till about noon. There was about $\frac{1}{4}$ inch of ice on my water barrel. There was no word of the St. Roche today but she was expected to arrive Tuktoo tomorrow. William Kuptana who has been here for several days returned to Kynner Point with his family.

Friday 20
Ocast W. Breeze cool.

The St. Roche arrived Tuktoo yesterday - The Chinook also arrived at Coppermine. The "Audrey B" is expected at Coppermine this evening.

Saturday 21

Mostly Ocast W. Breeze
Wadsworth party arrive Coppermine this A.M. to start a seal hunt down straight from the sea along Russian place.

August 27

Monday 22
Cloudy all day
63° Breeze strong

The "Audrey B." arrived at Coppermine last evening and left again this AM for Tuktuk. Wilkins & his party were preparing to leave this afternoon. We have had ice around here for the last two weeks. It loosened up a little today & we hope this east breeze will continue and take it all out. The St Rock left Tuktuk this AM.

Monday 23.
Partly cloudy 56 temp

Most of the ice is out of the outer harbour but there appears to be plenty to south and to the westward. I missed V.B.K. today either my clock was wrong or they did not come on.

Tuesday 24
Cloudy - calm mild

Some ice drifting in to outer harbour from east. The ice to the south appears scattered. Heard V.B.K. today. Sir Hubert Wilkins is evidently using Coppermine as a base in his search for Russian fliers now lost about 10 or 11 days.

Wednesday 25
Cloudy, North Breeze

Johnny Norberg arrived early this morning. He had been up to Walker Bay to bring back some goods for Canolaska. He saw no ice except just around here. There was no person at Walker Bay except a couple of natives who had just arrived there. Seals were seen but no seal. Johnny pulled out again at noon P.M. for Coppermine. No news from V.B.K. but I judged from what they said that St Rock must be getting in our vicinity again on her way back from Tuktuk.

Thursday 26
Windy - some rain & a few flakes of snow

I have been building a new mast to take the place of the one that blew down & broke in the Spring. I was going to paint it today but rain put a stop to that so I made a ball of the fur that Leonard traded. The St Rock was expected at Coppermine tonight.

August

27

Friday 27
West & W. breeze

Austin & his family arrived. Mr Kuptons & Tommey also visited & returned to Rymer Point. The Rock arrived at Coppermine last night - everyone seemed to be enjoying themselves on the broad beach today. The "Audrey B" arrived at Tuk. There is still some ice in the outer harbour but is loose & any boat could work through it.

Saturday 28
Clear light SW breeze
most of day. calm at
night.

Avanna & family left for home & Nulvana & Ekootuk paid a short visit. P.B.K. came on the air but he was so busy with keeping in contact with the Wilkins expedition that he only had time to say hello and goodbye. Although to day has been mild, the frost was so hard last night that it failed to melt completely on the water barrel.

Sunday 29
W. breeze - rain in
morning & evening

The St Rock left Coppermine for Vancouver - The RC boat "Our Lady of Lourdes" arrived at Coppermine - Wilkins left on another search expedition. Nulvana & Ekootuk invited.

Monday 30
W. breeze. some
rain. The breeze tailed today for the pole. The ice has practically all gone
around to NE in PM

The Wilkins expedition had been grounded at Frobisher
Island on account of bad weather but they hopped off
today for the pole. The ice has practically all gone
from around here now. There is quite a lot of ground
ice left.

Tuesday 31
Oscillating breezes
mostly N.W. some snow
flurries & some rain

The Mission boat left Coppermine for Bathurst. Mr Copland is due to leave for Read Island with Johnny Hobay this evening. He will meet the "Audrey B" there, she having left Tuktoo yesterday AM. They said the St Rock & the dog were together but failed to mention their location. Wilkins arrived back at Coppermine last night.

September

17

Wednesday 1
O'cast light N.E.
mild

Johnny Norberg arrived about noon with "Sel Eagle" from Coppermine. Accompanying them were Mr Copland & Capt Abraham of Coppermine detachment R.C.M.P. and some natives picked up at Rymers Point.

Thursday 2.
O'cast light N.E.
breeze.

Mr Chitty arrived back from Horton River with "Sel Fox". The "Audrey B" arrived about same time. Using Johnny's boat eagle and Mr Chitty's boat with the assistance of a flock of natives we unloaded everything tonight. I seem to have a very good outfit here and it will be difficult to find a reason if it is not turned in to fur.

Friday 3.
O'cast SW breeze

The "Audrey B" left about noon. Mr Copland accompanying them. The radio informed us that the Sel. Abraham had contacted the SS Vasopis off B straits. This was probably the second time in history that N.B.C. vessels have made contact using the NW passage. The contacting vessels coming from East & West respectively.

Saturday 4
O'cast SW breeze
rain in AM. fog
calm at night

Johnny Norberg with Capt Abraham left in forenoon for Coppermine via Bernard Harbour. I started to straighten out the stock. In loading the "Audrey B" at Tuktoo, they opened all the sugar & 24 c of flour so they could stow better - most of the flour sacks are torn & it takes time to patch it up & re-cake it. I heard Mrs Ross speak over C.J.C.A. tonight.

Sunday 5
Rain in AM. fog
SW breeze

A boy who came back from school this summer is helping me get the freight in the warehouse we have it all in except beans and A Klingenberg's goods.

Monday 6
O'cast calm

All the natives went out sealing but none were home. Frank Johnson arrived. I am busy opening goods. The village is anxiously waiting for the "Magdalen" as expected.

October 29

Wednesday 7.
Clear & Chilly
all day cloudy at time

Mr. Chitty & must have brought some cold germs along
with him. I caught a beautiful one and I notice
some of the natives coughing & sniffing. I am still
opening goods in the store - Mr. Chitty is anxiously
waiting for the Nigalik. Some of the natives got tired
waiting & went home.

Wednesday 8
Clear in AM. Cloudy
balance of day. strong
N.E. breeze

The ice on the water barrel did not chew today. There is
a little grounded ice in the outside harbour, yet from
Summer time but is going fast with this breeze. It is
not likely the Nigalik will be able to make much
headway today.

Thursday 9.
N.E. to N. breeze. clear

It has been a beautiful day with that snappy Fall
feel to the air. Mr. Chitty started last evening to build
a small house and by this evening the wall and
roof rafters were up with roof floor down

Friday 10.
Clear light NE
Breeze calm at night.

About nine this AM the mission schooner "Our
Lady of Lourdes" arrived (from Coppermine) (I wonder
what they want snooping around here) They stayed
only a short time. Avanna & his gang got tired waiting
for the Nigalik and left for home.

Saturday 11.
Clear. SE breeze

The glass is falling & it looks like a spell of dirty weather
for a change. A plane is leaving Edmonton Monday for Copper-
mine. Ron will be returning on it & Mr. Copeland
& Charlie Reich will be going out on it. The Radio has
been coming in in great style the last 10 days.

Sunday 12.
Cloudy overcast, SE breeze

Coppermine was getting fog & rain they heard the wheel of
the Nigalik but could not see her. I have practically finished
unloading & have all the goods in the stores were down.

September

37

19

Monday 13. The Coppermine radio has had very little news lately. Partly cloudy mostly today. There was a message for Capt Pasley saying that the "Audrey B" would take Kupana (Angulakuk's wife) along with Mrs Ross to the Okalukes. We are to go out from here to meet them.

Tuesday 14. O'cast. some rain in A.M. light NW breeze hazy & misty.

V.B.K. repeated the message and said the "Audrey B" would probably leave tomorrow. Mr Chitty is progressing well with the house he is building. If the Nigalik does not hurry, he will have it finished before she arrives. That man Parsley, from all accounts should be farming rather than running a boat. He wanders all over the country & it is only by the grace of God that she is still afloat.

Wednesday 15. Mostly clear but heavy clouds to south light var. grey. N.W 5 SW all day NC in evening.

The "Audrey B" will probably leave tomorrow morning. Mr Chitty & I will wait for the broadcast & leave for Okalukes immediately after. I packed all the coal that was left on the beach last fall by St. pines to the house. The weather continues comparatively mild, very little frost at night. All the ice has disappeared & there has been no snow remain on the ground so far this fall.

Thursday 16. Partly O'cast - strong N.E breeze swinging to S.E.

About 12° of frost during the night. The coldest night so far. It has been cool all day. The "Audrey B" did not leave Coppermine today. Johnny Norberg said he was going to accompany the Audrey back to Steptoe Bay then over to Read Island so it may not be necessary for us to go out to meet Cudney at Okalukes.

Cloudy mostly
overcast day for
tonight

W.M. was expecting to the Audrey as she must be enroute
to Tuktoo. Mr. Chitty & I go out to meet them and
we all arrived back here about 7 P.M. Johnny Norberg -
the Audrey's crewman Mr. Ross was on board having
just arrived from Edmonton with the brand new baby.
Today has been quite mild for a while it was
more like a Summers day than a Fall day.

Saturday 18
Partly cloudy.
foggy & drizzling

The Audrey & Johnny Norberg could not get away till
evening - they are going to Stegylton Bay from which
place the Eagle will return while Audrey continues on
to Tuktoo for another load. The Tuktoo arrives
tonight looking for Nighik. Etokona & his wife
rowed in from the west. Heard a couple of messages
over Edmonton station C.J.C.A.

Sunday 19
O'cast - High NE
wind - some rain
& mist.

We heard (V.B.C.) tonight talking to "Audrey B" she was
at Stegylton Bay ready to leave for Tuk in the AM. We
are getting very high water for a N.E. wind so it
must be N.W. some where not far from here.

Monday 20
O'cast, calm - foggy
& misty. N.E. breeze
spring up at night - some
heat.

Audrey left & was at Inman River at noon. Johnny
Norberg left Stegylton Bay 7:30 AM for here, arriving at midnight
in a heavy hail storm & high NE wind. Some natives that
arrived a few days left today for their respective camps.
We heard today that the Wukumaa Expedition was lost
or strayed around Akleevik. Radio stations were not in touch
with them.

Tuesday 21
O'cast - strong N to NW
breeze - some snow
flurries.

The Audrey B was at Peace Point. NW blow & snow prevented
them from leaving. The Wukumaa expedition was not
lost - merely landed on a lake, waiting for things to
clear up at Akleevik.

Wednesday 22
Cloudy - light wind.
Breeze

The "Audrey" pulled out from Pearce Point this forenoon heading for Cambridge Bay. They have not seen Nigalik. The weather continues comparatively mild. Thousands of the smaller band of Inuit have arrived and the natives are all busy bringing off large quantities of them.

Thursday 23
Mostly clear - calm

Johnny Norberg with a gang went to Rymer Point to move some Captains stuff to Read Island. The Audrey found Beebe Island and reported the Nigalik leaving this last Saturday. Audrey expected to arrive Tuktuk this evening.

Friday 24
Clear - calm

The "Audrey B" started to load at Tuktuk 7:30 AM. The Nigalik arrives here about noon & were busy unloading all day.

Saturday 25
Calm - clear winds

The Nigalik finished unloading early this forenoon. The weather came up foggy in afternoon & Nigalik did not leave.

Sunday 26
Cloudy - W. breeze
Snow flurries.

The Nigalik pulled out this morning for Cambridge Bay. It looked as though she ran for the calmness as she was doing some tail rolling. Audrey B prevented from leaving by NW breeze and snow.

Monday 27
Cloudy W. breeze
snow flurries.

All the visiting natives left again this morning. Weather having changed to west has stopped the arrival of Inuitmen.

Tuesday - 28
Cloudy - W. breeze
snow flurries.

The ground was covered with a very wet snow this morning - a lot of it melted during the day. The Audrey B left Tuktuk at noon today. Johnny Norberg did not leave owing to unfavorable weather.

September

37

Wednesday 29
Wind variable
brg.

"Audrey B" left for Coppermine with a stop
over at Resolute enroute. It was late when he left and
will probably stay at Resolute Point tonight. There are a
few foreigners around.

Thursday 30
Clear. S.E. brg.

About 1/2 of frost - ice on inner harbour this morning -
most of it drifted away during the day. Kinnikinnick
moved over to Victoria Land today. He will be going
up inland to fish as soon as the "Audrey B" gets
here.

Friday 1
O'cast. S.E. brg.

No position was given for the Audrey today. We
are busy getting things outside straightened away
for the winter. The coal oil, gasoline and coal are
all piled in their respective places. The coal for
this winter's use is piled near the porch. I will
throw a tarp over it & will act as a screen to for
keeping the coal box, coal oil & gasoline tins in.

Saturday 2.
O'cast. Southerly
brg.

The temperature only went to 26° during the night.
There is very little ice in the inner harbour. Mr Chitty
went over to the creek for water he says the ice is
about three inches thick over there. "Audrey B"
was off Darnon River at 1 PM. They expect her
to go to Stepperton Bay and be here early in AM.

Sunday 3
O'cast light NW brg.

The "Audrey B" arrived at 2 PM. We immediately
started unloading with Mr Chitty & his cargo boat
assisting. We quit at dark with only one load
remaining aboard. Fort Reliance's outfit was landed
here and will probably be assumed by this post. I don't
have to wait now for an addition to the warehouse
to hold the stores.

Tuesday 4.
Windy, clear N.
brg. some light
sleet.

Very light and early I unloaded coal oil, gas &
some lumber. The Audrey gets under way before
noon for Coppermine with a stop at Kinnikinnick.
We all clubbed in with Mr. Chitty and gave
him a hand hauling out his boat & too.

Tuesday 5
Windy clear, calm
and mild. some
snow flurries at night

We worked on the Fox and got it up to high water mark
by dark - the Audrey B arrived Coppermine 11 AM &
they were busy unloading with the assistance of the
Eagle as a lighter.

Wednesday 6 The snow that we had some time ago was practically
O'cast - calm - heavy melted and there was no snow on Victoria Land
full of snow in afternoon except back on the hills. We had a couple of hours
of heavy snow this afternoon. I shifted the lumber &
checked it.

Thursday 7
O'cast, NE brg., snow
flurries in evening.

We pulled the Canalska cargo boat out and erected the
Chitty radio mast. The Audrey B has finished unloading
& they expect to leave for St. Mary's Bay tomorrow. Helene
& Evertuk families went inland to fish. They do not expect
to be out till Christmas. Kinnikinnick & Elok plan on
leaving for fishing late tomorrow. There is a little
new ice on the inner harbour up to Grandine's shack,
the rest of it is still open.

Friday 8
O'cast - strong NE brg. been in the wind till now. brought them in the house
running to NW - light tonight. Audrey B. & Johnny Norberg left Coppermine
brg. at night. amiss this morning. All W3 goods with the exception of bread
is in the warm house. Store & warehouse are so full now I
don't know where to find room for the customers.

Saturday 9. As coppermin & Keweenaw they are getting a new wind
Oscillating NW wind. The Audley B is held up at the latter place. I have been
working in the warehouse trying to make more room
by replacing the seas stuff.

Sunday 10 NW breeze - O' east
Like last night the wind switches to NW. The inner
harbour froze over during the night. The radio which
has been more or less of a wash out for the last
week was coming in better & we heard C.J.C.A. last
night on their weekly "Hello The North." program.

Monday 11 Although the inner harbour has been frozen for
O' east - calm - mild two nights, this is just about. Got a few
of the large Pterinopis around today. Yesterday
was the last day of the daily broadcast from V.H.F.
They will be on a ten weekly schedule from now till
open water next summer.

Tuesday 12 It has been just freezing in the shade the last
clear - light SE breeze couple of days. Pterinopis around again today. I
finished piling Walker Bay coal. My outside work
is getting well cleaned up before the early weather
sets in. I do not know where the Audley B is. It
was expected she would call in here again on her
way back to Coppermine but she has probably taken
advantage of the fine weather and gone back to
get into Winter Quarters.

Wednesday 13. Most of the outer harbour was covered with shadowed
this morning but it kept moving out to west &
by evening was almost clear again. The Audley
arrived just before dark from Stapeyton Bay. They
intend to lay over here tomorrow. The gang were
here for a ptarmigan dinner tonight or was it a
beer?

October 37

Thursday 14
Ocast N.E. storm
some drifting.

The Audrey B. remained at anchor in outer harbour all day - the crew came ashore this afternoon & it was blowing so hard they decided to sleep ashore tonight. Today has been the coldest day 5° above as many as we can guess, I had two thermometers ^{one} in this year and with the ~~the~~ I had & Mr Chittys they all register to suit them selves and are all different.

Friday 15
Ocast NE. Storm
some snow falling

The outer harbour was full of mud ice this morning. The wind kept it moving and for most of the day it was packed in along our beach while the rest of harbour was open. The crew of Audrey B. got out to the boat this morning they had considerable difficulty getting through the slush with their jolly boat. A group of natives arrived from P.A. Sound today - Amokot is here while Kahot & Pumashuk ^{are at CTC} are at CTC. The breeze slackened off this evening so Audrey B. should be able to get away at daylight.

Saturday 16
Clear - calm - cold

The Audrey B left this morning we could see her out to the south before sun up. The outer harbour was all frozen over this AM. The natives who came in yesterday crossed the harbour on foot to bring back their dogs & sleds. The Audrey at 1 PM was off Kivunstern. Had worked ice (new) from Read Island to Okalluk's and from this on there was open water.

Sunday 17
Ocast. SE. Breeze
milder.

The natives arrived back with their dogs, early this morning and loaded up and departed back to Prince Albert Sound. They reported having killed some caribou, saw lot of footprints & report the land overrun with timber and stoneman. The Audrey B. arrived at Coppermine last night. Heavy snow fall tonight.

Monday 18
Ocast. N.E. breeze
drift.

The ptarmigan are still around. I got none today as there is not enough for winter food. I am going to put up a tarp at the rear of warehouse to hold some biscuits to make more room in the store but the wind the other day ripped the tarp so I think it would be unsuitable for winter. I have made more room in the store now by repainting so I will not need an annex.

Tuesday 19.
Ocast. Strong N.E.
breeze with drift; cold

Mr. Chitty and I had planned on cutting ice today but the high wind spoiled our plans. The ice in the harbours is holding against these winds but it is all open to the south.

Wednesday 20
Ocast - very light
S.E. breeze - mild

Mr. Chitty, Johnn Jenkins (foreman) William Knutson and I cut ice, about 160 cakes of various sizes. The ice is 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick. The temperature is barely freezing. sun toasts

Thursday 21
Ocast. very light S.E.
breeze

We cut ice again making it just over 300 cakes. No ptarmigan were seen today. Heavy snow fall this evening with slight increase in wind velocity.

Friday 22
Light E. breeze. clear
mild

The weather continues mild and the eastly breeze seems to be a disease this year. Some ptarmigan appeared today and were promptly bumped off.

Saturday 23
Ocast E. breeze
drift - Some snow
sleet & rain.

We had nearly every thing in the weather lens today. This morning it was blowing and the snow was drifting as great from then it started snowing which soon turned to sleet then rain, then it cleared up. The breeze died out. Then breeze sprang up again & for blue hour & we had a mist - Tonight is light E. breeze & quite mild.

October 57

Monday 24 A light but steady rain in evening breeze from N.E. sled. The rain yesterday and today has put a glaze on everything. It will make it tough on wild animal. The buildings & every thing outside are coated with ice - my sled which was standing on end is already iced ready for the next job. At coppermine the freeze up has not come yet & Edmonton said that the temperature was 75° the highest in 45 yrs at this time of the year. M.R. & B.C. Districts. Radio 20% off for

Monday 25 O'cast. NW wind The breeze banded around to NW last night and is blowing hard all day. Both harbours are still frozen but open water comes right up to Read island at East & the West end & the South side.

Tuesday 26 William & Johny went out to the edge of the ice on south side of island to try & get a seal. There were no seals but they saw the tracks of a bear & her cub. They had been prowling around the east end of the island & all over Igloolik and then went out onto the open water towards Rymer Point. They were evidently frightened away by the dogs howling. These are the first Bear to be so close to Read Island since we have established here.

Wednesday 27 O'cast. NE breeze snow. The breeze has changed back to NE increased to a strong gale this afternoon & blew hard the rest of the day. The temperature remains mild. Some snow fell & there is plenty of drifting.

Thursday 28 mostly o'cast. light N.E. breeze We can see open water to the south, all to east & west appears to be frozen over. We have not seen pelicans for three or four days.

- Wednesday 29
Clear - foggy
I was unable to erect the new mast built this summer so turned it away from the house where it will not drift over.
- Saturday 30
Clear - calm
I made a cover for the coal pile, that is the coal for this winter's use. It adjoins the porch & makes an additional porch and keeps the snow from drifting over the coal. I will keep the coal box out there this winter & that will keep the coal dust out of the porch.
- Sunday 31
Ocast very foggy & misty.
I made a door frame & door for the coal shed. shifted the ply boats away from the usual drifts and put the canvas around the lower half of the house and started to bank up.

November

- Monday 1
Ocast - foggy - light & some snow.

November
Everything outside is covered with frost. A couple of natives arrived - Pooyuk was acting from Assauas & drifted in for a friendly visit - Louis & Optoma & family arrived from Rymer Point. Fishing is poor at Assauas & good at Rymer Point. A bear did some damage to Sheep house.

- Tuesday 2
Clear - calm

The floor under the beds has always sweated in the winter time by way of experiment I built a platform which filled with sandust and put the bed on it. It remains to be seen whether it works.

- Wednesday 3
Clear - calm

VBK said it was -17° today & was only -4° here going down to -9° in evening. Jake Ootwooyuk visited from P.A. Sound and Etosuk & Nebuna came in from their fishing traps.

Thursday 4
Clear - calm.

Averna, Teddy O'hina & Sam drafted in from Corrano's they report the sea frozen over as far as they can see so sealing is over for this season. These men all report a lot of Fox tracks on the land and practically none on the coast.

Friday 5
Clear - calm

Kimball & Etrok & families came in from their fish camps on a lake two days NE of here. I have put on an extra window on two of the windows and it makes a wonderful difference. Before, they used to freeze up every night and then in the morning the ice would melt and run over everything. There is no frost now on windows!

Saturday 6
Partly cloudy
strong NE breeze.

All the market news that we get from outside sources over the radio indicates that fur is down from 10 to 20% but there has been nothing specially noted regarding white fox and we have had no word from D.O. although Mr Bartleman has been sending frantic messages to river Posts.

Sunday 7
O'cast - light NE b'g

The natives have been out sealing but saw only one and did not get it now with this wind the ice has broken off just off the islands so there should be some more hunting but seal have been scarce all summer & fall.

Monday 8
O'cast NE b'g

The natives are busy sealing & taking traps & seal up on the land preparatory to the rush to get traps set.

Tuesday 9
O'cast NE b'g

A native from Averna ^{Teddy} paid us a visit today. The natives are getting the odd seal. The weather remains mild.

Wednesday 10
Cloudy, N.E. breeze.

The natives who came in some time ago from their respective fishing camps are preparing to go back in the morning.

Thursday 11
Partly clear, N.E. breeze

Neluk, E. Kotuk, Kinnikutun & Etuk left for their fish camp. William Kuptana & Poyuk left to Idlalik trapping camp. Just heard to day that Poyuk's baby just over months old has been getting fed on flour & water because they ran out of milk. They thought they could fool the baby because the food looked like milk. Perhaps I should order some white meal for baby food.

Friday 12
Partly cloudy light
N.E. breeze

The place seems deserted around here now with all the natives gone. The Chilly was over for a while today. He is progressing with the new house he is building. practically all the inside work is finished now & he is building cupboards etc.

Saturday 13. The temperature was up to 20° above. Last night for Clear: calm wind a while the wind or breeze switched to S.E. & we had a light fall of snow this AM. The radio has been coming in good. CJCA is loud & clear at midnight & they have long code messages for B.C. destined.

Sunday 14 The temperature remains mild, well above zero. There was no snow falling. Foggy & calm. were two long code messages over CJCA for Pier River & B.P. Posts but they were based on a tariff later than the one I have here.

Monday 15 An other beautiful day, with bright sunshine. a westerly clear air head wind breeze sprung up in evening but soon died out. The clouds on horizon - calm house is nicely banked but difficult in finding snow hard enough to cut.

November 31

- Tuesday 16 Weather unchanged Another beautiful day and I dashed out and planted a few traps. Saw only one fox track, numerous tracks of Arctic hare & lemming, 2 ptarmigan. There was a push up of ice near west end of Igloolik. It appears to be about 20-25 feet high.
- Wednesday 17 Same weather Not a fox in my traps nor any sign of runtrack. The moon is just about full & with the clear sky and no wind, it makes the nights glorious.
- Thursday 18 Some Weather though sunny William Kuptana & Poujut arrived back off their trap line, they report foxes fairly numerous and expect a good year as they do not seem to be migrating out on to the ice.
- Friday 19. Clear over land but misty on tundra, calm. I finished putting on the storm windows all around. They should make a difference to the house. We now have three window seals on each.
- Saturday 20 Foggy - Calm Kinnikinn & Seltok arrived back from inland & left for a visit to Arvianna's. They say the fox are not taking bait very readily.
- Sunday 21. West breeze - clear colder Kinnikinn & his partner came back from Arvianna's they say there are numerous tracks on the land down that way - none on the ice - there are a lot of lemming moving out on to the ice.
- Monday 22 Poor visibility but the natives are out setting W.breeze Fog Snow more traps - They seem to be going concern'd this year.
- Tuesday 23 Hail & fog It was very thick early this AM but I cleared up during the day. I am getting the books in order.

Wednesday 24 I decided out to see one traps and that Clear & calm was all I got, the view. The natives were right U. Gray didn't think when they heard there were no tracks on the ice.

Thursday 25 The island is deserted again with all Clear-Calm the natives away to their traps - Just one month till Xmas - How time rolls along.

Friday 26 Quite a strong breeze blew all day with some drifting foggy with poor visibility. Rad mag from D. Marja 10% drop

Saturday 27 Calm very foggy. The radio has been poor the last week but picked up this evening. We received a message of greeting from the Fur Trade Commissioner over the CBC. There was also a message to Mr. Kengs River Posts 15% drop from their last Tariff in all fees.

Sunday 28 Foggy - calm A news item today announced that the Wilkins expedition (searching for the lost Russian fliers) which has returned to Oakbank with a new plane will make their base at Beechey Island & will establish a radio station there.

Monday 29 Clear, light & breezy. We took the two pups out for a walk out. This was the second time in harness. They worked better the first time. It gets dark early these days, we have to light up just before three AM.

Tuesday 30 The Sun came only partly up on the horizon today. Johnny Erickson returned from his line yesterday catching nothing. He says there are not so many seals & the few that are around will not take bait. It will be tough of the fur pelts out at this stage of the game.

Wednesday 1
Windy day, calm

Mr Clitheroe was over for a visit. He found all his last outfit returns in a stationary cupboard. He thought he had sent them out last summer but evidently it was only the Walker Bay returns that went out. This will necessitate him sending a team to Coppermine soon - Fortunately my books are up to date having finished up November last night.

Several local native families came in from their fishing lakes. They report a diminishing amount of tracks & foxes caught. Kinnuktun & Eelrok caught nothing on their way in.

District Office frequently wish to know what the prospects are. It is so hard to tell. There may be many foxes around now and a week from now they may all be gone and on the other hand many may come over night - there seems to be no scarcity of food so it is quite likely that there will be foxes around for some time yet in which case we should have an average year of from 800 to 1000 foxes but the wish may be father to the thought.

The sun did not show over the horizon today.

Thursday 2
Cloudy, light breeze
some snow.

Taptoona returned to Rymer Point. Kinnuktun & Eelrok are off visiting local lines of traps. Eelrok got nothing. Kinnuktun went home this morning and not visiting a short trap line.

Friday 3
Clear, calm cold

Pooyuk and Eelrok went waiting to Asiaras the former to pick up some seal.

A pack of families arrived from Arana's evidently to make this their headquarters for a time.

Sunday 5
Clear calm

Johnson Erickson returned last night from his traps he got skunked that makes the third successive poorhuk. He says there are more tracks farther inland than when he was out before but foxes will not take bait. Amos arrived today. He lives with Ole Anderson & traps from Richardson Isla. rd to Pyne Point. This is his first visit this season.

Monday 6
Clear & Calm

Amos says there are more foxes than last year but that unless foxes start coming thru will not be a bumper year. Johnson Erickson is making preparations for a deal to Cappadocia on Wednesday. He has only four dogs so he does not expect to break any records.

Tuesday 7
O'cast SW breeze
knowing.

It was clear this morning with a beautiful red sky but it soon changed when the blouse got up. The glass has fallen so we may be in for a spell of bad weather. Our meat is all ready in case tomorrow is a fine day & Johnson does get away. There has been no natives in from Prince Albert Sound since trapping started, some of them must be getting low on supplies and I expect some over in any time now. Even Arana has not been in. I expect to have 350 to 400 pelts by Christmas if the Prince Albert Sound gang come in at that time. Last year some of them went to Igloos for Christmas and then on up to Harker Bay to trade after Xmas.

Wednesday 8
Windy day.

John Tidball was to have gone to Coppermine this AM but weather prevented. Plans are altered to leave now on Friday owing to unsettled condition of weather.

Thursday 9
Clear, light N.E. breeze.

It was a beautiful clear cold day. Nakok Kyrk with Pte Komingsat & Joe Kuglana arrived from P.H.S. They report the death of Mark Numicena an old man of failing qualities who has traded with the Company for many years. He had some debt on this outfit & his wife or widow is now trapping to pay it off. Trapping in the Sound is good so there should be some good catches made this year.

Friday 10.
Clear, light S.E. breeze.

The long expected mail plane arrived at Coppermine today stayed only a short time and then returned without news left for his home but Johnny Oream still remains here.

Saturday 11.
Clear, Calm -30°

The three men from P.D.S. returned to their trapping grounds today and Johnny finally left for Coppermine. Radio was poor but we did hear a message from our C.R.C. and there was some news in a message to MR. pto to the effect that another drop in fur prices was expected.

Sunday 12.
Clear, light N.E. breeze -30°

The temperature has been cold for a few days but eased up. -8° & is not so bad now. The radio reception was much better again.

Monday 13.
Clear, Calm -30°

I have had some difficulty in getting my S.W. radio hooked up but finally got it connected and apparently in order although I have not tested it yet.

Tuesday 14.
Clear, calm -30°

Algie arrived from Williams Point. He reports no fur down that way. He having caught only nine.

December 17

Wednesday 15 I could not get my radio working so packed it
 Clear - calm up for future reference. There are now nine snow
 houses here all being around Canalaska owing to
 no snow drifts around here. Kinnikinn & Erik
 arrived on off their trap lines this morning.

Thursday 16 The weather holds good with almost a full moon
 Clear - calm the nights are nearly as light as the days.

Friday 17 Several new snow houses went up today. The old houses
 pretty decent - storage getting very cold.

Saturday 18 Avanna & family arrived this afternoon. His fur
 coat does not look as healthy as I had expected so
 my traps at Christmas will not be so high as I
 had anticipated. Etokonka's fur will be below
 normal as he traps in the same territory.

Sunday 19 The weather has taken a turn for the worse thought it
 E. drags. Clear, dry.

Monday 20 The wind hunted around and blew pretty hard but
 N.W. drags. Wind was quite continuous mild. The radio has gone
 bad again and lately we are getting very few stations
 and then with little volume. Johnny Onearm has
 been expected back the last couple of days but no
 sign of him yet.

Tuesday 21 Etokonka & Tadidish arrived shortly after noon.
 Semiconductor. It looks as though there will be very few natives
 in for Xmas compared with last year.

December

37

Wednesday 22
Ocast. calm

Same people arrived from Prince Albert Sound today for Christmas. Tommy Goose also arrived from the other side of P.A.S. enroute to Coppermine. He reports very few foses to the north of P.A.S. amongst those arriving day was - Amakok - Pumashuk - Komingoat and Klinneenes Wilton Sarah.

Thursday 23
NW wind drifting

A strong wind (low) sprung up late last evening and blew all night but was not too bad today - Johnny Nohberg and Amos arrived Richardson Island. Johnny has done the best of all the hunters, having 150 foses to date about 3 times as good as the next best man.

Friday 24
Strong NW breeze
drifting

The weather turned bad again last night and was certainly getting in the evening but is not too bad today again. We heard a message from Mr. Opland sending greetings to us all in the north including CGE employees. This has been a busy day and I do not expect to be in a Christmasy mood till after the natives have all gone and we can settle down and have our own Christmas.

Saturday 25
Ocast. Strong NW breeze

Christmas Day. I think all the natives in the world were in today to shake hands. They danced all last night at Canalaska and there is another gathering on tonight. We gave them a Christmas feed which they took to their snow houses and stored away.

Sunday 26
Ocast. NW breeze

The weather has been rotten all the last several days. The natives had a race but we took no part in it. We will put up a new cabin when the weather is better.

December

37

Monday 21
Clear calm cold

Aaron, Eustache & Tashishuk left for their trapping grounds to the west and Tommy Gore for Coppermine. The rest of our Christmas visitors are planning on getting away in the morning.

Tuesday 22
Clear calm -40°

Some more of our visitors left this morning. Amokok & Pimashuk went back to P.H.S. Johnny Norberg left for Richardson Isd and some of our local hunters visited short trap lines.

Wednesday 23
Clear calm -40°

I got started on my books again after the visiting horde left. The post inventory was not made out last summer so will have to go out in January mail. With the large stock on hand now including Walker Bay goods there should be few requirements.

Thursday 30
Clear calm

Working on Registration - no visitors today so made some progress. Tom Melots sent up some fresh caribou meat some time ago so we will have a bit of a blow-out tonight.

Friday 31
Ocast, strong NE wind
heavy drift.

Tommy Gore had apparently not arrived at coppermine up till broadcast time. There was nothing from them except that the teacher is planned to leave Sunday for an extended tour of Prince Albert Sound and up as far as Walker Bay. The radio is a wash out tonight. Happy New Year.

Saturday 1 Working on the books today - There are several natives
Ocast light & breeze families camped here - The men will be going to their
traps tomorrow. They are all CTC men.

Sunday 2 The traps all got away to their trap lines. It is very
Clear, calm -50° cold but so calm that it is really nice out.

Monday 3 Another beautiful day. We were working on Inventory
Clear, calm -50° and the books.

Tuesday 4 Considerable drifting but the temperature has risen.
Clear - strong SE wind We finished December books & typing Inventory with
exception of servants. There was a message to
Fort Tidewater from Wyoming re forwarding Dovorn to us
and quoting for retention in London. Johnny Dawson
returned from his trap line - caught only 1 fox.

Wednesday 5 Things are very quiet around here as most of the natives
Ocast light NE breeze men are away visiting traps.

Thursday 6 Mr Chitty said he saw the tip of the sun today
Clear Calm mild but I think it must have been reflection as it
seems too early to see the real Sol.

~~Friday~~ 7 Rev Failes Burkard accompanied by Tommy Gore
Clear calm mild arrived from Coppermine. They will remain over a
day before leaving for Walker Bay.

Saturday 8 Mr Chitty & the Father were over for supper last
Ocast calm mild night. The Father was talking about the wind-mill
driven generator for lighting that they have at Copper-
mine, he says it is the only thing for this
country, it gives satisfactory light at minimum
cost.

Sunday 9. The killer did not get away because Tommy running after Goss was not ready.

Monday 10. West southwest. There is about 3" of soft snow on the ground. The killer got away to a good start - owing to the soft snow he decided to go along the coast.

Tuesday 11. N.W. breeze E. west. The weather continues mild with temperature running from zero to -10° . The breeze is not strong but owing to the light snow it is blowing it around considerably.

Wednesday 12. West calm hazy. Very poor visibility. V.B.K. came on the air and played one record and then cut off.

Thursday 13. West light E. breeze. Colder today. The haze has cleared up somewhat and traveling will be better.

Friday 14. Clear calm cold. The temperature was very low. The post thermometers are no good. When temperature gets real low the liquid gets pink and gradually shades in to red; then when it starts to move up it always separates. Although they are supposed to register to -16° they are not much use below zero. We saw the sun for the first time today but owing to a haze we saw only a red ball. It was up quite high so has been back several days.

Saturday 15. Calm, cold. Another cold frosty day with just a faint eastward breeze. The radio was good last night but tonight we cannot hear a station.

Sunday 16. West light S. breeze. Inability to receive from down past Avonlea to say they are catching a few frogs.

The clouds still stay with us but we did see the O'cast calm winds seen for a short time today.

Wednesday 19
O'cast, calm, mild

Wm Kuptana is all set for a dash to Coppermine to connect with the mail plane. The weather continues O'cast & it looks like snow. The radio has been absolutely dead as far as outside stations are concerned since last Saturday.

Thursday 20
O'cast, calm, mild

There was a light fall of snow during the night. Wm Kuptana got away to a good early start. I sent my Radios (SW) down to Coppermine for repairs.

Friday 21
O'cast, calm, mild

Two dogs arrived in from the seal camp. They are getting a very few sets but sufficient for their immediate needs. V.B.K. had a skid with one C. belt at 830 PM. They told us W.Kuptana had arrived. He made it with one sleep wheel is good time for this time of the year.

Saturday 22
It was thought yesterday that t.l. plane may come in. We may possibly have made Coppermine today. Quite strong breeze.

Sunday 23
A terrible day - our east windows are drifted over. Strong w. bry. drifting and it is up level with the roof. Glass is racing as it may not last. Radio still dead and V.B.K. came in with full volume today.

Monday 24 Windy. Day light
W. breez.

V.P.M. thought told us the mail plane had arrived and
was staying over night. Mrs Deacon, wife of Ch. op.
in charge of Radio station was among the passengers.

Tuesday 25 Clear. calm.

It is good to see the old sun again. It is just high
now and the days have lengthened out nicely.

Wednesday 26 N.W. breeze. low ground pulled out this morning but it was blowing and
drifted.

The plane left Coppermine yesterday and Wm Kuptana
N.W. breeze low ground pulled out this morning but it was blowing and
drifting down there and he was the only one to leave

Thursday 27 N.W. breeze. sometimes
quite strong.

The early part of the day was fine but it began
to blow in the evening and just whooped it up
for the night.

Friday - 28 Gusty. strong SW
wind at times

The weather was unsettled again today. It was
blowing a gale for a while around noon. Wm.
Kuptana arrived this afternoon with the mail.
I had a letter from Mr. Jevon who says the foxes are
plentiful in there. I hope they move out this
before the season finishes.

Saturday 29 Clear, light N.W. breeze

We had a good mail and we still digesting it.
Aviana visited today. He has been sealing along
good. Jake Ootunguk arrived from Prince Albert Sound
he was travelling with an old fellow Snowlark but
they became separated in the blow and the old
fellow has not shown up yet.

Sunday 30 Clear, light N.W. breeze.

Some natives come in from the seal camp - They
are getting a few, barely enough for their needs.
There is still no sign of the old fellow. The radio
is still a signal out. Coppermine being the only
station we can hear.

Monday 31

Setting up a new radio antenna to P.A.S.

January

Tuesday 1. All the people are in from the seal camp now and we bring mostly dogs are preparing to visit their trap lines. The radio for outside stations seems good around seven PM some nights and then it goes off again. It is nearly three weeks since we had outside news.

Wednesday 2 Clear Breeze NW The old man Enowelook lith in this forenoon. He has been wandering around on the land between here & PAS. for the last eight or nine days. Fortunately he had fish so is now in worse for his outing.

Thursday 3. ^(mug) All the natives left for a visit to their trap lines this morning. Teddy Chokok (a man that drifted down here from Walker Bay last summer) returned because his primus stove broke. He has caught two foxes so far and did not get any seal. God only knows what he, his wife and two kids has on to say nothing of the dogs. It is surprising that he is so useless being a Baillie Is. and native. He has been at Walker Bay up here for several years now and cannot build a snow-house.

Friday 4 The N.W. breeze has been blowing with varying force for about a month now. The temperature remains low. There has been nothing starting in the way of news from Coppermine though they continue to come in well even though no outside stations on the broadcast band are coming in at all.

Saturday 5 The canary that my wife brought in with her (Clear, NW breeze light) did not sing during the short days but started again yesterday and today. Spring must be on the way.

Sunday 6 I think all the ladies & kids are in the settlement.
Clear, NW breeze cold paid us a visit today.

Monday 7 Two of the native hunters returned from their trap.
Clear, NW breeze cold lined today one caught 10 and the other 16 so
there are some foxes still around the bay.
and there were few tracks. Nukimamuk &
his wife Blubber face paid us a social call.

Tuesday 8 Drafting to beat the band all day. The radio
Clear strong winds still refuses to work. In as far as outside
stations are concerned, it has ^{radio} the longest spell
of dead weather that we have ever experienced.

Wednesday 9 The RC Bushops plane arrived at Upperniut to
Clear light & breeze pick up Andy L'Heureux and a couple of natives
who became lost some time ago on a long return
and were severely frost bitten. The plane will
take them to Smith Harbor.

Thursday 10 Etrook visited a short trap line today but caught
Clear calm cold only one & saw only one track. Much all the
wind that we have been having, the snow
is very hard and tracks may not be noticed.

Friday 11 Our local natives pulled out in their seal
Clear, calm cold camp again. Nukimamuk shot a seal from
the O'Fallon Islands the other day.

Saturday 12 A beautiful day the temperature went up to -11° in
Clear, calm cold the sun but is down to -50° tonight. The radio
is still a wash out but seems to be improving
slightly.

Sunday 13. Mr. Chitty was over for a visit. We have not seen nearly Oct. calm most of him for some time.

Monday 14. The radio shows more improvement. We got some news. Clear - calm until this evening for the first time in about six weeks.

Tuesday 15. Quite a strong breeze with considerable drifting. Clear - strong N. breeze but it died out in the evening.

Wednesday 16. Coppermine Radio informed us that a Mr. A. S. Pierce had been there today with a party of tourists including the big shot Harry Smiley.

Thursday 17. The radio reception has come back to normal and we are getting in touch with our relatives now.

Friday 18. We had a note from Coppermine Radio saying Tom Webster would be leaving on 21st for Read Is.

Saturday 19. William Kuptana & Pooytuk arrived off their trap lines yesterday. They say there are more tracks now than there have been all winter.

Sunday 20. Pooytuk & William went out to the seal camp. Sam came in from there and says they are getting just enough seal to keep them going.

Monday 21. The weather has been bright but cold going down to -40° at night. The sun is getting well up so we do not have to light up till 5:30.

Tuesday 22. It is very quiet these. All the natives are out mostly clear SE by E making good and we are getting a good spell of Read & quietness.

~~Tuesday 23.~~ Some snow fell during the night. V.B.K. said that Mr Webster had left, was going as far as Ikey Bolts camp & he sent word to W.S. advising them to get their boat down to Ikeys not later than Mar 5th.

~~Thursday 24.~~ The gales has fallen rapidly and it looks like we're N.E.ing, and Gandy are in for some dirty weather.

~~Friday 25.~~ Western, west. The temperature has turned round and the wind has increased till it is blowing & drifting to beat the band.

H.W. Gale. Very strong wind with drift, all day visibility nil. Mr Webster & Mr Chitty came over for dinner & froze their faces on the way. Mr Webster baptized the baby Rappene Fredrie James.

- Thursday 3. Clear calm winds The natives arrived some days ago and have gone to reset their traps and not returned yet.
- Friday 4. Clear light breeze A strong wind got up last night and drifted considerably but it had died down to a gentle breeze by morning. The radio is working good.
- Saturday 5 Clear, calm The radio has picked up and at times performs to perfection but there is considerable fading especially in news programs. We heard a message tonight from Bishop Benumont saying he would not be in owing to nervous breakdown.
- Sunday 6 Clear calm Aviana and family arrived in today and spent the night. This is certainly a grand guy. It is too bad there are not more natives like him.
- Monday 7 Clear light breeze Aviana left for home this morn. Rev Father Boulleau arrived from Walker Bay & Prince Albert Sound. He will be leaving in the AM for Cappemine. He reports absolutely no fur road of A.S. - Andrew Klingenberg a good hunter with a long trap line out had caught absolutely nil. They and other Western natives had very few. The high man had around 15. Kinnakatum & Edok returned from their trap lines today and the like did not catch many, they saw two or three very new traps.

Saturday 18 Stormy broke o'cast and calm but it started to snow about noon & the wind got up soon after. Father Bouillard left Coppermine Wednesday for here and Walker Bay - we had expected him here today.

Saturday 2. Cloudy (and cheetred) left today on his return to Coppermine. Father Bouillard arrived just after noon from Coppermine. Katch & Nebrana arrived from P.Q. Sound.

Sunday 3. The Father left early today on his way to Walker Bay and way points. He intends to spend the summer near Holman Island.

Monday 4. Spring burst out in all its glory today. It first started to fall from the roof of the store.

Tuesday 5. Some snow fell early this morning. Arana and his mostly deer & caribou traps arrived today & will spend Easter here.

Wednesday 6. A most disagreeable day with the low snow that fell yesterday, blowing around.

Thursday 7. The radio reception has peters out again, even the short wave is silent - V.B.K. is the only station on the air.

Friday 8. The local natives are out nearly every day to Clear, calm, miles west their seal traps. Seal are very scarce - some day they get one or two but mostly nothing. Taptoona got a young coon today.

Saturday 9. The days lately have been lovely with very clear though cold nights.

April 25

Tuesday 10 Ptarmigan are around - not abundant but may be more than there were last year.

Wednesday 11 Iashuk arrived from about 25 miles to west. Kuptana & clear, calm, quiet arrived from Prince Albert Sound with word that Hikok Kyrok had died. He is the second of our first string hunters to pass out ^{dangerously}. It also left a flock of unpaid debt. Paluk also arrived from Prince Albert Sound and Kivuktuk came back from inland where he has been fishing.

Tuesday 12 Ice is not coming in as well as I had anticipated. Clear, calm, mild and from the looks of things, I will not make the figures I had set to reach.

Wednesday 13 Ptarmigan are fairly plentiful and the natives are hunting them every day. Sealing also seems to be improving. Gotskona returned from his camp to the westward and some people arrived from PHS Aniakchak, Koniagash, Ootwoyek & Pemashuk.

Thursday 14 Johnnny Inukay arrived this evening from Coppermine.

Friday 15 Clear & bright, cold. Plans are being made for an Easter derby amongst the natives. They are going to race out to and around one of the Linton & Sutton Islands. No whips allowed and the racers can run out if they wish but must ride back. They are also talking of holding a shooting match.

Saturday 16 The natives held a shooting match today. Poorly organized the shooting was rotten perhaps due to bad weather.

The weather continues mild but is at Change - except a little on the south side of buildings. I again returned from Kynner point.

NE breeze. Cloudy.
ground drift snows.

The post radio has not been working since Easter but I had it going for a while today. Heard most of KBR. Ursana arrived back from Coppermine late tonight.

Clear light N.E. wind

Kimball arrived from Kugangnak last night with Ursana - Ursana son-in-law accompanied them. He will stay with Ursana in the outfit. His son-in-law Katoruk is an old acquaintance of mine from Bear Lake & Kugangnak days. Saturday 7 Yesterday & today are real Spring days. Saw clear calm warm. The first of the spring birds - I do not know the name. Eskimo arrived this morning. Mr Webster & his natives also pulled in this AM. I finally got my radio in to operating condition and we got both short & long wave reception C JCH comes in good at midnight.

Sunday 8 Mr Webster is staying here but holding services (clear light SE breeze) (3 a day) at Canalecuk.

Monday 9 My ice on the ice stage was melting so fast
Partly Ocast, SE breeze that I had to put it into barrels. Nelsana returned from a Bear hunt. He got three, a mother and two cubs.

Tuesday 10 The snow is very soft today and water is appearing on the ice. All the natives had to knock the mud off their sleds. Mr Webster left this evening for Coppermine via Bernard Harbour. most of our visiting eskimos also pulled out.

Wednesday 11 The weather is still balmy and the snow is settling. There are only three native tents on town now.

Thursday 12 Amuktuk, Anorvik, Purnatuk & Kaktok arrived
Ocast, foggy, some from Prince Albert Sound. Katorgok (Savik) went pulled in from up Holman Island way.
The Sound natives report the death of Pungut a man who has been ailing & crippled for years.

Friday 13 The breeze hauled around to N.W. and turns cold 12°
Ocast, SE breeze everything tightens up again - Ootwoquk arrived from P.A.S & pe Kuytana returned from Chis.

Snow & drift. The natives must be having an uncomfortable time living in tents today. All our natives are in now and the trade is about over except for an odd fit from a few natives who are expected in from distant places and I do not count on them having many as they will have traded before arriving here.
- Sunday 15 Clear sunny N breeze The weather is still freezing and wind eastward and disagreeable. The natives are getting the moving stage & will probably be leaving the day after tomorrow. The radio has been pretty good both long & short wave.
- Monday 16 Clear - stiff breeze The temperature is still cold. There are plenty of ptarmigan around & lots of small birds.
- Tuesday 17. Iadidieak arrived I do not know why as he had Ocast heavy snow nothing except a black eye which he picked full most of day N breeze up from the anchor when it jumped out of snow. E. Blok & his mother arrived back late this day.
- Wednesday 18 Partly Ocast. Calm just thawing Iadidieak left again about six teams minus last evening from Walker Bay Geo Porter & his gang. I understand they will be around here till Geo goes west with Schooner Fox.
- Thursday 19 Partly cloudy S breeze Kinnuktuus arrived back from a seal & wood gathering hunt over near Besley. He got 15 seal. Weather has turned mild again.
- Friday 20 Clear light S breeze Knasgash & a young fellow Etokoria arrived from Krusenstern. Some of our local hunters arrived back from seal hunting.

They pulled out for Lady Franklin Point, some of our local natives returned yesterday from sealing and returned out on the ice again. They are doing fair. The natives report many foxes out on the ice hunting young seal. Geo Potter paid a visit this evening.

It is thawing in the day time but freezes up tight every night. We had expected Mr Chitty to send a team to Coppermine but evidently it has been called off now.

Tuesday 26
Clear NE breeze cool

On Sunday 22 a son who born to Mrs & Mrs Jenkins Malibank a western Indian who came down from Inukler Bay with Geo Potter.

Wednesday 25
Clear NE breeze cool.

It still thaws in the day time but turns cold at night. The green foxes have all been stretched. I had them all stretched just before Easter and we took over a hundred furs for trading with the trade. Next year we should start docking natives for skins not stretched.

Thursday 26
Clear NE breeze - cool

The midnight sun has been with us now for several days. Nekemah blew in during the night.

Friday 27
Clear calm warm

The natives are in and out so much these days that I cannot keep track of them. The report having been ducks, geese, gulls etc. I started painting during the ceiling a coat.

Saturday 28. The days now are quite warm but every thing clear-color-warm freezes up solid at night. The natives for some time now have reported large teal ducks.

It is opening up earlier than it has done for several years past. Mr. Shultz received a message regarding the Canalaska Trading Company being taken over by the Hudson's Bay Company so we will have to get ready taking inventory. The natives have not been told as yet - I wonder what their reaction will be. Some of them have been very loyal to the CTC but I do not think it will make much difference to them coming over to the company.

Sunday 29. These sunny nights are grand, I only wish clear color. Warm we could get most of them off painted up & on the other day is still not dry enough to paint.

Monday 30. The snow is melting a lot of the land today. I had to cut a channel about 1/2 mile of the store to let a pool run away - there is still a lot of snow around the buildings.

Tuesday 31. Another fine day but the breeze kept the temperature down but water was running every where. Good night Canalaska this is the night you pass out.
